Country Has Declared for Peace-He Acquiesces-Has Been Enough Blood-Ac= cepts American Sway.

"I believe I am not in error in precoming that the unhappy fate to which my adverse fortune has led me is not a surprise to those who have been familiar with the progress of the war. The lessons taught with a full meaning, and which have recently come to my knowledge, suggest with irresistible force that a complete termination of hostilities and lasting peace are not only desirable, but absolutely essential to the welfare of th

solutely essential to the weathre of the Philippine islands. "The Filippinos have never been dis-mayed at their weakness, nor have they faltered in following the path pointed out by their fortitude and courage. The time has come, however, in which they find their advance along the path to be impeded by an irrein which they find their advance along this path to be impeded by an irre-sistible force, which, while it restrains them, yet enlightens their minds and opens to them another course, present-

ing them the cause of peace. ing them the cause of peace. This cause has been joyfully em-This cause has been joyfully em-braced by the majority of my fellow-braced by the majority of my fellow-countrymen, who have already united countrymen, who have already united around the glorious sovereign ban-around the United States. In this of the United States. anner they repose their trust and slief that under its protection the Filipino people will attain all those promised liberties which they are beginning to enjoy.

"The country has daclared unmis-takably in favor of peace. So be it. There has been enough blood, enough tears and enough desolation. This with country he proceed by the peac tears and enough desolation. This wish cannot be ignored by the men still in arms if they are animated by a desire to serve our noble people, which has thus clearly manifested its will. So I repeat this will, now that

it is known to me. After mature deliberations, I resolutely proclaim to the world that I cannot refuse to heed the voice of a people longing for peace, nor the lamentations of thousands of familles yearning to see their dear ones enjoy-ing the liberty and promised generos-ity of the great American nation.

"By acknowledging and accepting the sovereignty of the United States throughout the Philippine archipelago, as I now do, and without any reserva-tion whatsoever, I believe that I am serving thee, my beloved country. May bencines by theo." happiness be thine.

ing all its energies. Aguinaldo, now that he has accepted Aguinaldo, now that he has accepted American sovereignty, probably will be given more liberty than he has enjoyed hitherto. His services will be used as far as possible in the pacification of the islands. The extent, however, to which he will be permitted his free-dom is for Gen. MacArthur to deter-mine, with the assistance of the Taft commission, for the aim of the home government here will be to rest large-ly upon the views held by its repre-sentatives in the islands.

SENATOR TOWNE'S OPINION.

There is, however, an expression that somewhat alters my opinion of his astuteness based on the methods are based on his previous conduct. He says that the Filipino people will, under the sway of the United States, obtain all 'promised liberties.

"He cannot have forgotten the as-surance of Gen. Anderson in 1898 as to the justice with which our allies against Spain would be treated or the solemn promises of the benevolent assimilation.

"One thing should be borne in mind: the surrender of every hostile force in the Philippines, and the absolute ac-ceptance of our dominion throughout the archipelago does not dispose of the question involved in the acquisition and government by this Republic of distant colonial dependencies. Wrong as the pollov is, and cruel as it is against the Filipinos, it is infamously more wrong and cruel from the stand-point of the welfare of the United States."

"HONEST TOM' SAMPSON.

Gen. Corbin Says There Will be No Material Change, Washington, April 19 .- Adjt. Gen. Corbin authorizes the statement that no material changes will be made in the army in the Philippines until after the war department has heard from

en out. AGED MORMON LEADERS.

A Denver Newspaper Calls Attention to an Interesting Fact.

The ripe old age to which the Presilents of the Mormon Church have lived s a noticeable fact, says the Denver News. Brigham Young died at the age of 76 years. His successor, Presi-den Woodruff, lived to be 91 years old. President Snow, who succeeded Wood ruff, has just celebrated his 87th birthday. Apostle Cannon, who has just died, was 74 years old. The Mormons have now been fifty-five years in Utah, and many of the pioneers who made the exodus across the plains in 1845-47, among them not a few of the Church eaders, still survive, at ages ranging from 75 to 90 years. In stating the

fact the News will leave others to ac-count for it. This longevity of the Mormon pioneers is certainly remarkible, and perhaps some plous Mormons will ascribe it to the practice of po-lygamy. The real explanation possibly is that these men were of a sturdy physical nature, which was strengthened and developed by their early life on the plains and in their intermountain ter-ritory.
