Governor Cutler Announces That He Will Not Call Such a Meeting Now.

MAKES LOGAN PEOPLE HAPPY.

Executive States That He Was Not Influenced by the Protest Made By Cache County.

A decision not to call a special session of the legislature to consider consolidation of the University of Utah and Agricultural college was arrived at yesterday afternoon by Gov. Cutler.

The announcement followed a hearing of Representative Joseph Howell on the question of consolidation, and the presentation of a petition against an extra session. In making the announcement to the press representatives, Gov. utler stated that the receipt of the petition had not influenced his action, as he had made his mind up before that time. He felt that there was a great diversity of opinion in the state on the question, and felt that the decision not to call an extra session would please most of the taxpayers.

President Kerr of the Agricultural college, who was at the Kenyon durng the hearing before the governor, stated afterwards that the decision pleased him, as it would give the Agricultural college time to make its po-sition clear to the people, an argument which was used forcibly a year and a half ago, to secure a postponement of action by the last senate.

The list of those signing the petition against an extra session includes men from almost every town, but contains a smaller percentage of men directly interested in educational problems than the petition for consolidation, while it contains a larger percentage of busi-ness men and members of the Manufacturers & Merchants' association.
