# WOMAN'S SINFUL LIFE AND SUICIDE

Read the Scriptures and Concluded That the Future Was Without Hope.

### CAME HERE A STRANGER.

Tried to Screen Her Identity-Was Married in Denver and Has Parents Living in Portland

Suffering from despondency and brooding over her unhappy life, Madge Miller, a woman of the town, who came here about three months ago, presumably from Denver, committed suicide about 7 o'clock this morning in the Holmes roominghouse on Second South and State streets, by taking a large dose of morphine and shooting herself behind the right ear with a cheap ,32 caliber revolver.

She had been an inmate of a resort at 14 Commercial street, and for several days was very despondent and repeatedly threatened to kill herself. Yesterday she read for a couple of hours, the book of Revelation, in the New Testament, and several times exclaimed, despairingly to her companions:

"O: what will God do to me for all my awful sins?" Her friends tried to cheer her, saying that better times were coming, but she refused to be con-soled. Last night she was out with a companion, and it is believed with a couple of men. They drank considerably and at 10 mlutes to 7 o'clock this morning, the two women went to the roominghouse and entered room 90, which had been engaged for them by some man. Shortly after going to the room, the Miller woman asked her friend to go and get some water. The latter at first refused, fearing that the woman intended to kill herself. Just before this Mades sent a messenger before this, Madge sent a messenger boy for some morphine. After her friend left the room she took the poison and then shot herself, dying almost instantly.

Her companion heard the shot and ran screaming to the landlady's room The latter, after satisfying herself that the woman had committed suicide, telephoned for the police and Sergt. dington quickly responded. He then not fied Coroner Clark, who examined the remains and ordered that they be removed to Evans' undertaking parlors. Justice Clark decided that no inquest was necessary and none will be held. The gun with which the woman com-

mitted the rash deed was purchased by her several weeks ago. Yesterday she looked over a number of letters, and after reading them and crying for some time, she burned them. She cried near-ly all day and said there was no happiness for her in this life and no release from her misery. She left no message for any one and apparently tried to conceal her identity. Madge Miller was the name she gave when she first came to Salt Lake, but it was learned from a faded marriage certificate that she was married in Denver in October, 1898, to J. E. Jones, and that the ceremony was performed by a justice of the peace there. Her maiden name as given on the certificate was scarcely discernable, but Justice Clark managed to decipher the name of Aurora Tullron-well. It was also learned that her parents reside in Portland, Or.

It is assumed that she has been here

for only about three months, as she has paid two monthly fines at police headquarters. Mrs. Stewart, landlady the roominghouse, was greatly

shocked over the affair.
"It is awful that a thing like this should happen in my house," she said. "I didn't know who the woman was. I never saw her before that I know of. two women came here before 7 o'clock this morning and went to room 90, which had been paid for. Shortly after, the other woman ran screaming to me and told me her friend had shot herself. I immediately notified the officers.'

The name of the woman who was with the suicide, could not be learned, as she left the place immediately after the arrival of the police and the coroner. No arrangements will be made for the funeral until the woman's parents have been heard from.
