Berlin has been provided with water-works costing \$2,450,000.

Switzerland has about 900,000 cattle, worth \$42,000,000, and 552,000 cows yielding \$30,000,000 worth of milk a year.

A young woman named Anna Arnold won the first prize at the city shooting festival at Williseau, Switzerland, recently.

Fifty-one volumes of the *Congressional Globe* sold recently in New York for thirty cents.

A novelty is the marabout parasol, covered entirely with down; it looks like carrying a snowbank or dismissed cloud over the head.

General Slocum is said to like dogs, and has a bulldog which was at his side in all the battles in which he took a part.

Gilmore, the originator of the Boston Peace Jubilee, has been presented by the grateful Boston people a \$25,000 residence and \$50,000 in cash.

Sturgeon's nose has become a matter of newspaper comment. An irreverent scribbler says it is as much read as his sermons.

A schoolmistress in Porter county, Indiana, construing physical punishment literally, gave a tremendous cathartic to a refractory pupil a few days since.

Ten millions, nine hundred and twelve thousand, six hundred and fifty pounds of freight were received at the Union Pacific depot in Cheyenne for the first five months of the year, according to figures in the Cheyenne *Star*. In the same time the freight forwarded west amounted to 2,409,650 pounds.

Fourteen old girls assembled at a party at Saxton's River, Vermont, the other day, their united age being 1,043 years. The oldest, who was 91, on being invited to ride home in the evening after the party, resented the invitation, and answered testily that, "she'd rather walk."

London keeps growing. Its population has not been counted for seven years, but it is estimated now at 2,128,335. In it more than 115,000 children are yearly born, and 75,000 persons die. The metropolis, including the suburban districts, stands upon 77,907 acres, or 12 square miles.

The King of Prussia has presented to the Viceroy of Egypt a splendid porcelain vase, six feet in height, from the Berlin manufactory. The ground color is blue and the handles bronze, the whole being richly gilded and decorated. The base is ornamented by a picture after Steinbrunn's design of "The Elves," from one of Teich's fairy tales.

A French lady of rank has sued for a divorce from her husband on the ground of ill-treatment and desertion. One of the most serious items laid to the charge of the defendant is that, when he returned from the Mexican campaign, instead of flying at once to Pau, where his wife was staying, he sent her the following telegram: "Where are my shirts? I can't find them." All Pau soon became aware of the laconic dispatch, and the Princess could not leave her house without being asked what she had done with her husband's linen.

A private letter from Puerto Plata, St. Domingo, gives the following account of Santa Anna, the ex-Dictator of Mexico, of whom nothing has been heard for some time past: "The irrepressible Santa Anna is residing in Puerto Plata, busily engaged in writing a history of his life. He appears to have abandoned his Mexican plans, and says that he intends to return to Staten Island at an early day, there to spend the balance of his days. The Dominicans do not appear to look at him with much favor, but tolerate him as long as he does not meddle with the political affairs of their country."

The value of the railroad freights in the United States during year 1867 was over \$1,500,000,000, or four times the total of the national debt. The average annual increase for the ten years preceding was \$737,000,000. In 1867 there were 29,000 miles of railroad in this country. It is estimated that in 1880 we shall have 70,000 miles of railroad, transporting 140,000,000 tons of freight, giving freight values at \$20,000,000,000. The advantages of railroads, and the grand indications to be derived from the carrying trade over them, are compactly presented by this record and calculation. Of all the States in the Union that should show the largest figures in improvements, by reason of railroad constructions within its borders, California stands first and foremost.

There is a well-authenticated story of a poor woman—not precisely a beggar, but who had a petition to present, the prayer of which was, of course, aimed at her piousness. She was, however, as she was coming out of the garden of the Retro. Her prayer was soon heard, but, unhappily, when her Majesty felt in her pocket, she found that she had no money.
