The loss is, however, balanced by the gain in nev births. Tall men are supposed to live longer than short ones. Women are generally stronger than men until their 50th year, afterward less so. Marriages are in proportion to single life (bachelors and spinsters) as 100:76. Both births and deaths are more frequent in the night than in the day. One-fourth of men are capable of bearing arms but not 1 out of 1000 is by nature inclined for the profession. The more civilized a country is, the more full of vigor, life and health, are the people. The notion that education enfeebles and degenerates the human frame, is not borne out by fact.
