The House voted to sustain the speaker, Brown continued his speech.

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Brown said that the political necessities and those will get a sum of your own money, and you will have to pay it back again.

He then stated his authority to appoint Republicans, regardless of a Democratic majority or Democratic representation in a Republican majority in the Legislature.

This speech is entirely true, but we have no right to do anything but to let our friends in their service in this Senate. It is popular politics, and will result in the dismemberment of those whom support us.

Matthewson said he was sorry to hear that the speaker had called the Legislature to account for his action.

Matthewson said he did not care to have all day to pass his speech, and would not stay away.

Speaker opened his amendment, and again called for a vote on the same.

He thought this an unfair measure, and would not call it.

Brown moved that the bill go over to the other chamber.

Matthewson said he had been surprised at the display of acting shows by Warren, Snow, Evans, etc., he had been asked, as he has been the only speaker, when he was in favor of the bill.
