## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Carpets for Building**—Nearly 3,000 pounds of carpets were received yesterday afternoon, at the Federal building for use in the various departments there.

**Lecture at University**—President Kingsbury lectured yesterday afternoon, at the state university, on "Thoughts Pertaining to Man and His Education."

**To Command Batteries**—Major Stephen M. Foote of the artillery corps will command the two batteries of light artillery to march from Fort Douglas to Fort Russell, April 1.

**Debating Society**—A debating society is talked of in the High school for teachers and a number of students. Miss Duke, the head of the English department, is the mover in the matter.

**Application for Water**—W. K. Walton and A. C. Call of Woodruff, Rich county, filed application with the state engineer yesterday afternoon, for 15 second feet of water from Birch creek, to irrigate 2,540 acres in Rich county.

**Draper Sent to Jail**—Justice of the Peace Bishop of Farmers' ward last night committed Joseph Draper to the county jail for failure to support his minor children. Draper has served time in the county jail before upon similar charges.

**Asks for Relief**—A petition in bankruptcy has been filed in the United States district court, by Herbert D. Fairchild, an electrician of this city. The schedule places the liabilities at \$680.88, and the assets at \$50. The last named sum being named as exempt from execution.

**Found Unconscious**—Griffiths M. Mansfield, a young man of 20 recently discharged from the Marine service, was picked up unconscious on Commercial street this morning, by Police Officer Carlson, and was sent to St. Mark's hospital. He had injured his head by a fall on the sidewalk. Mansfield is en route to his home in Patterson, N. J., from the Pacific coast.

**Want Their Own Building**—At last night's meeting of the Real Estate association it was decided to try and raise funds to secure a separate building for association headquarters, and a special committee was appointed, viz., R. A. M. Fries, W. J. Halloran, and Walter G. Tuttle. President James Pickett of the Business Men's league of Helena, Mont., was present and addressed the meeting on conditions up north.

**Busy Day in Court**—There were two divisions of the criminal department of the city court yesterday afternoon. In the first division Judge C. B. Diehl was engaged in the trial of the tainted pork case, in which T. M. Herbert and H. A. Barton are the defendants. Judge Whitaker was called in to dispose of the regular afternoon docket. The principal case to come before the latter was that of James McBride, 8. Baer and A. S. Richards, charged with fighting early on Tuesday morning in front of the Chesapeake restaurant, in which a plate glass window was broken. The evidence went to show that Baer had nothing to do with the fight, and he was accordingly discharged, but the two defendants were found guilty and a fine of \$10 was imposed in each case.

**President Cannon Arrives**—From a telegram received today by William C. Spence, it was learned that the White Star liner, sailing from New York, arrived safely at Liverpool, at midnight last night. Among the passengers were President Angus M. Cannon, his sister, Mrs. Mary Alice Lambert, and his grandson Elder Geo. M. Cannon, Jr. The latter accompanied his grandfather, and Mrs. Lambert to England with the intention of visiting the old family homestead of the Cannons on the Isle of Man, and there gathering genealogical data. Elders Albert D. Foulger and David G. Shorten of Ogden leave tonight for England. Elder Shorten has been called to labor in Great Britain, while Elder Foulger upon his arrival in England will be joined by Elder George M. Cannon, Jr., and proceed on their mission to South Africa.

# ANOTHER SUIT AGAINST TEE.

Western Securities Company Demands an Accounting for \$100,000.

## ALSO ASKS FOR A RECEIVER

To Take Charge of Affairs of the Western Agency, Concern Organized By the Defendant.

An action was filed in the district court yesterday afternoon by the Western Securities company, in which it is asked that the Western Agency company, organized by Hiram Tyree, president of the Continental Life Insurance and Investment company, be placed in the hands of a receiver and that an accounting be made by the Agency company and Tyree of the funds received from the sale of the stock of the Securities company, and that an injunction be issued to restrain them from disposing of any of said funds.

MATTER OF \$100,000.

Both of the companies mentioned were organized by Tyree, and it is alleged that his connection with the Agency company was kept a secret from the Securities company and after the contract was entered into whereby the Agency company was to receive all of the funds from the sale of the capital stock of the Securities company and the latter in return was merely to receive 10 percent of the premiums for insurance written by the Agency company for the Continental Life. This contract, it is alleged, was made for the personal benefit of Tyree, and it is asked that he be removed and it is also asked that Tyree and the Agency company be compelled to account for the sum of \$100,000 received from the sale of stock, and that they be restrained from disposing of any of said money. A receiver is also asked to take charge of the property of the Agency company and of the property of Tyree.

## VERDICT FOR THOMAS.

The jury in the case of Hannah Saline against Albert Thomas, which was tried in Judge Ritchie's court, has returned a verdict finding the issues in favor of defendant. Mrs. Saline alleged in her complaint that Thomas struck her and knocked her down during a neighborhood quarrel, and her injuries were claimed to be permanent, for which she asked damages in the sum of \$1,000. The jury, however, found that she was not entitled to damages and rendered a verdict in favor of Mr. Thomas.

41 B. C.—Julius Caesar was killed in the battle of Pharsalus.

1592—John Endicott, colonial governor of Massachusetts, died in Boston; born 1583.

1794—The American colonies began King George's war, a name given to the hostilities between British and French colonists in America, stirred up by their sympathies with the home governments in the war of the Austrian succession. The principal event was the capture of Louisbourg, a French stronghold in Canada, by a force of New Englanders. The exploit gave the colonists an idea of their own military strength. By the treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle, 1763, the war ended, and Louisbourg was restored to the French.

1797—Andrew Jackson, seventh president and otherwise noted, born at the Waxhaw Settlement, N. C.; died 1845.

1825—Main became a state.

1859—War in Samoa; American and British ships bombarded native villages.

1865—The pass, key to the post-treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle, captured by the Japanese.
