The proposed bridge over the East River at New York is estimated to cost \$7,000,000, and to require six years for its construction. It will be a mile in length.

A woman who for eighteen years past has peddled matches in the streets of Detroit has paid for a house and reared and educated three children, all of whom have good trades.

An American, while breakfasting at an English tavern, astonished the waiter by requesting him to take his coffee out into the yard and "pump the water out of it."

The English Parliament is investigating the Sunday sale of newspapers in the kingdom, and thinks of compelling the Sunday paper proprietors to publish on Saturday. Six thousand persons are employed in the traffic in London every Sunday.

At a recent meeting of the stockholders of the Atlantic Telegraph company, it was officially announced that the income from messages averaged \$700, or \$3,500 in gold per day. The receipt of this amount shows that 2,000 words pass over the cable every day.

The United States Ministers to Hayti, Liberia, Sweden, Belgium, Bogota, Bolivia and Nicaragua, each receive \$7,500 per annum; those to Russia, Austria, Spain and Mexico, \$12,000 each; and those to England and France, \$17,000 per annum each.

An Ohio editor is getting particular about what he eats. Hear him: "The woman who made that butter we bought last week is respectfully requested to exercise more judgment in proportioning the ingredients. The last batch had too much hair in it for butter, and not quite enough for a waterfall. There is no sense in making yourself baldheaded, if butter is thirty-five cents a pound."

A very beautiful statue of the Indian Bacchus has been dug up on the Ostian road, and is now to be seen at the studio of the sculptor Altini, in Rome. It is evidently of Greek origin, with a beautiful head, entirely undecayed. It is offered for sale for 60,000 francs. But for the poverty of the Roman treasury, it would be purchased for the Vatican Gallery.

True bravery is sedate and inoffensive; if it refuse to submit to insults, it offers none; begins no disputes, enters into no needless quarrels; is above the little troublesome ambition to be distinguished every moment; it hears in silence, and replies with modesty; fears no enemy, and making none; and is as much ashamed of insolence as of cowardice.

An order has recently been received at the Metallic Cartridge Company's works in East Bridgeport, Ct., from Madrid, for ten million cartridges of the Berdan type. The immense amount of work done at the Cartridge works has compelled their enlargement to nearly double their former capacity, and a dozen new furnaces have recently been put up. On Russian and Spanish orders these works will soon be able to turn out 125,000 cartridges daily.

The New Haven Journal thus describes a new method of heating passenger cars: "A bonnet is placed on the top of the car at each end, to catch the wind while the car is in motion, and the air rushes down a pipe in a corner inside, close to a stove, which is made with a hot air jacket. On the floor of the car stands a closed box partly filled with water. The air rushes directly into this water-box, where it is thoroughly washed, and passing into the heater is forced into pipes that run, near the floor, the whole length of the car, on each side and under the seats. At proper intervals these pipes are perforated with small holes, through which the heated air then escapes. The arrangement gives satisfaction."

Think of twelve innocent looking gentlemen in a box in Smith county, Texas, listening, with wide-open eyes, to the following charge:

"If the jury believe, on the evidence, that the plaintiff and defendant were partners in the grocery, and that the plaintiff bought out the defendant, and gave his note for the interest, and the defendant paid for the note by delivering to the plaintiff a cow, which he warranted not to be a cow, and the plaintiff refused to receive her and the plaintiff took her home again, and put a heavy yoke on her neck and died; and if the jury further believe that the defendant's interest in the grocery was worth anything, the plaintiff's note was worthless, and the cow good for nothing, either for beef or milk, then the jury must find out for themselves how they will decide the case, for the court, if she understands herself, and she thinks she does, don't know how such a case should be decided."

The verdict was "yes," and both parties appealed.
