LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

A Proclamation of Thanksgiving.
BY THE GOVERNOR.

Whereas, His Excellency, U. S. GRANT, President of the United States of America, has, by Proclamation, appointed and set apart THURSDAY, the 30th, day of NOVEMBER, A. D. 1891, as a day of Public Thanksgiving and Praise unto Almighty God, for His blessings vouchsafed unto us as a nation during the past year:

Now, Therefore, I, GEO. L. WOODS, Governor of Utah Territory, do by this my Proclamation, call upon all the people of the Territory of Utah to meet at their respective places of worship on said day, and lift up their voices in Songs of Praise and Thanksgiving unto him who holdeth the destiny of the Nations in His hands, for the manifold blessings which we, as a people, have so richly enjoyed.

We have been the favored children of the Republic.
No great Calamity has visited us.
Peace and Prosperity everywhere prevail: our Granaries are full; our Mines are rich and inexhaustible; our Future is full of promise.

Let all the People rejoice, and the Praise of God be blessed by every tongue.

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of Utah Territory to be affixed. Done at Salt Lake City, on this, the 3rd day of November, 1891.

THE LUMBER LIQUOR CASE.—The matter of application to the District Court for injunction, by C. Loomis against Salt Lake City, was postponed until some time next week, when the grounds of the application are to be heard. In the meantime the City authorities retain possession of the saloons of Loomis, Tucker & McKim and J. R. Turbitt. Those parties, we understand, are offered to give bonds for the privilege of carrying on business until a final settlement of the case is arrived at, but, up till two o'clock this afternoon, bonds had not been given nor accepted.

THEATRE.—To-night the opening piece will be the fine Scotch male-drama, "Steenie, or the Bride of the Border," which will be followed by a Grand Soiree de Variete, including Lingard changes by Carroll, family, and entertainment concluding with "the Omnibus."
To-morrow night the grand complimentary benefit to Mr. Carroll comes off, and on Wednesday evening Mr. Johnny Allen and Miss Alice Harrison make their first appearance at the Theatre, in McCloskey's grand play of "Schneider."

LEFT TO THEIR MERIT. Some of our most temperate and sensible exchanges regret that "the Salt Lake leaders are left to the mercy of Judge McKim and his confederates," in consequence of the "no appeal" provision of Congress. We are most obliged to our considerate contemporaries, but the "Salt Lake leaders" are not left quite to the tender mercies of those gentlemen yet. Besides, although the Hebrews before the Red Sea were left apparently to the mercy of the Egyptians, the sequel proved that the Hebrews were in the preferable situation after all.

PREACHING.—We are in receipt of a letter from Elder Mark Lindsay, now on a mission to the Eastern States. The communication is dated Bridgeton, New Jersey, Oct. 30th, and states that he is in good health and spirits. He had commenced his labors in preaching the gospel, and was likely to meet with fair success.

IN GOOD COMPANY.—Somebody denounces the Omaha Herald for having a good word to say about certain parties, and the Herald commences to answer thus:—

"The Herald is now credited with denouncing Mormons, Indians, and Rebels. In the former it finds itself in the excellent company of Chicago Baptist Ministers, the Sacramento Union and other radical journals, Grace Greenwood, and other conspicuous loyal males and females."

FATAL ACCIDENT.—"A.C.," writing from Brigham City to the Ogden Junction, on the 2nd instant, says:

Last Friday about 10 a.m., a little boy, aged two years, son of Cliff Olson, of Mantua, Box Elder County, fell into a bucket filled with hot water, while his mother was washing clothes. He fell in a half sitting position, his stomach and chest were scalded that after a few seemingly painless hours he expired quietly.

MAKE IT A CRIME.—The St. Joseph Herald says of the peculiar institution of Utah:—

"It needs but to make it a crime against the law to cause most of its adherents to renounce the Mormon faith and to some once more into harmony with the moral sentiments of the age."

Now the Herald ought to know better than to urge persecution, legal or illegal. It would be just as wise to urge the making of baptism a crime at law, and hope to thereby abolish the Mormon faith, as to make plural marriage a crime at law and hope thereby to abolish that kind of marriage. When will the newspapers learn a little lesson? We are getting weary with the stupidity of some of them.

SERVICES AT THE TABERNACLE YESTERDAY.—Elder David Gifford occupied the time in the forenoon. In the afternoon Elder Orson Pratt preached.

ABOUT APPEAL.—The Philadelphia Age has the following:—

"One result of the recent trials in Utah Territory, will probably be an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States, on the decision there, upon the jurisdiction of the Federal government over the subject of marriage. In the States it certainly has no such jurisdiction, and it has never before exercised any in an organized Territory, with a legislative body competent to make laws on local subjects."

To which the Omaha Herald answers:—

"The Federal Court in Utah fixes its jurisdiction, without regard to law or precedent. There is no appeal from its decisions."

This refers to criminal cases, and the object of the "ring" appears to be to make all "Mormon" cases criminal, if possible.

No Tin.—The Washington Star states that the following respecting "That Utah Mine":—

"Samples of so-called tin ore received at the General Land Office from Utah Territory have been subjected to a chemical analysis, also to a crucible assay, but in neither case could the least trace of tin be detected."

How's that? We should like to hear what our expert tin miners have to say to this. The Star gives no names, but gives the Utah tin ore a "bad name" on general

principles, based on a specific analysis and assay. It is bad for say, reasons that have no tin, but it is absolutely ruinous for a tin mine to show none.

"ALL ARE TALKING OF UTAH" in deed and in truth. The papers are full of it, and they ought to consider themselves under many great obligations to the "Mormons" for furnishing the occasions for so much interesting matter. Our columns are far too limited to give our readers a quarter of a fair representation of the good, bad and indifferent things which are being said about Utah. So we must be excused for any apparent lack of attention to any of our contemporaries.
