LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Sunday Services.—Sunday Schools in session at 10 a. m.; Ward Meetings at 2 p. m., and at the usual evening hours. Home missionaries will visit the various outer Wards of the Stake.

Trimming Trees.—The shade trees on the sidewalk extending east from the Eagle gate, are being trimmed. Similar work on the trees in other parts of the city would be esteemed as a benefaction by pedestrians who pass under them these dark nights.

Eleventh Ward Ball.—On Monday evening next, a select party will be given in the Eleventh Ward Assembly Rooms. None but those having invitations, or who are favorably known to the committee, will be admitted. It is the design to have the affair strictly select and agreeable to all who attend.

Junction Jots.—Mayor Herrick is around again, after his recent severe illness.

Marshall Wm. Brown has also recovered so far as to be out of doors, and expects to regain his strength speedily.

Postmaster Kimball has gone to Washington, on business. His efficient assistant, Mr. Jos. Hall, is doing the honors in his absence.

Improving Snow Drifts.—Late Train. Thomas Williams, the railroad man injured Thursday, by a switch engine, is improving.

Snow drifts along the Utah and Northern build the cowcatcher of the locomotive, Friday morning.

The Union Pacific Express, due last evening, was telegraphed five hours late, and was not expected in Ogden until after 11 o'clock last night.

The above items we glean from the Dispatch.

A Happy Occasion.—A social party was held last evening in the 16th Ward, in honor of the returned missionaries, Elders Joseph Bull, W. J. Lewis, Jos. H. Parry, Thos. E. Howells and Wm. N. Williams. The dancing was interspersed with singing by the choir led by John Vincent, and accompanied by Bro. Arthur Parsons, organist. The house was well filled and the best of order and happiness of spirits prevailed.

Just Complaint.—We are informed that all the water which has heretofore supplied the wants of citizens living on and near the East Bench is being monopolized by persons near the mountains for filling their ice ponds. The wells in many parts of the 10th and 11th Wards are drying up, and the total failure of the supplies in the ditch makes it necessary for the people to haul the water for culinary purposes and for their stock, in some cases about three-quarters of a mile. Can no relief be afforded the suffering people.

Railroad Mass Meeting.—The mass meeting held in Provo, Thursday evening, to consider the advisability of accepting the proposition of the Utah and Pleasant Valley Railroad Company, for the continuation of the narrow gauge line from Springville to Provo, was well attended. Mr. W. H. Dusenberry was elected chairman; Messrs. J. B. Keeler and C. W. Emerson, secretaries; and Messrs. James Dunn, Thomas Beasley, W. N. Dusenberry, J. E. Booth and George W. Jacques a committee on resolutions. Speeches were made by Judge Emerson, Judge Dusenberry, J. B. Miller, Esq., and Mr. Doremus, when the following resolutions were adopted:

To the chairman and gentlemen in mass meeting assembled:

We, your committee on resolutions, ask to report the following for your consideration: Whereas, The Utah and Pleasant Valley Railroad Company are desirous of extending the line of their road from Springville to this city; and Whereas, We hold it to be beneficial to our mining, manufacturing, commercial and agricultural interests to encourage cheap and rapid transportation; and Whereas, It is the intention of the said company, in case the said extension is made, to construct a machine and other shops in our city, thereby giving to our citizens employment, and increasing a demand for our products; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, as citizens, in mass meeting assembled, hereby cordially invite the said company to extend their road to this city.

Resolved, That the City Council of Provo City, is hereby requested if their finances will admit, without creating or incurring debt, to purchase the right of way for the south line of the corporation to the proposed terminus of said line in this city; Provided, that the cost be not over \$1,000; and in case the City Council cannot agree with any owner of land as to price, then the railway company shall condemn such land, and the city pay therefor.

Narrow Escape.—Friday's Junction, our regular copy of which, by the by, we have not yet received, contains the following:

Yesterday morning, Mr. Thomas Williams, in the employ of the C. P. Company, was standing upon the track sealing a train of cars, when another train, being switched on the track upon which he stood, bore down upon him, felling him to the earth. Fortunately for him, he fell so that none of the cars passed over him. He was picked up and carried home, when it was found that he had sustained a severe scalp wound, of about three inches in length, besides sustaining a painful wrench in the small of his back. Dr. Anderson waited upon him, and dressed the wound. Mr. Williams' injuries are not considered very dangerous, though at present their full extent cannot be determined. We hope, however, that they may prove no worse than at present indicated.

Sunday School Entertainment.—We have received tickets to an entertainment to be given in the 21st Ward Meeting-house, on Tuesday evening, the 18th inst., under the auspices and for the benefit of the Ward Sunday School. It is the first affair of the kind attempted by the Sunday School pupils, and from the programme before us, is bound to be a highly interesting performance. The bill is in two parts, each of which consists of a judicious and nicely arranged variety, including songs, instrumental solos, dialogues, recitations, stump speeches, etc., etc. Mr. Wm. D. Owen is conductor, and Master Jos. McIntyre accompanist. The admission fee is merely nominal.

New Contracts.—We learn from the Leader, that Hon. M. D. Hammond, of Providence, Cache County, has taken the contract for digging a canal 25 miles in length, for a mining company up in the Snake River country. On Tuesday he sent the first train of heavy wagons, loaded with supplies, accompanied by a large number of men and teams, to the scene of the work. The same paper states that the U. O. Foundry are putting up a new shingle mill for S. Holt & Co., and have just delivered 80 school desks to Wellsville, of the Gus Lundberg patent.

Murder Near Corinne.—The following special was received this morning:

BRIGHAM CITY, Nov. 15, 1879.

To Deseret News:

Dan Wight was fatally shot by Bill Bailey, near Corinne, about 5 p. m. last evening. They were quarreling over a young lady in company with Wight. Both were under the influence of liquor. Bailey placed himself under the protection of the sheriff. Wight died soon after 2 o'clock this morning.

Primary Organized.—The organization of the Primary Association of the Third Ward, was effected yesterday afternoon, under the direction of Elders E. B. Wells and S. M. Haywood. Between 30 and 40 names of children were enrolled.

Ipse Dixit.—It has been aptly asserted (by "most unwilling witnesses") that the "musical mule," mentioned in our issue of last evening, is the local scribe of a morning newspaper down the street.

Police Court.—This morning a case of disturbance and profanity was fined \$10.

One man for insulting language, another for larceny, and still another for running his horse on the streets, were placed under arrest. The last was fined \$5, but the others have not yet had a hearing.

Knocked Down.—A young boy, named William Dell, while crossing the street from Kimball & Lawrence's to the Emporium corner, this morning, was knocked down by a horse and buggy driven by a lady around the corner westward. The boy was trampled on and run over, but barring his torn clothes and a few slight bruises, escaped uninjured. He was assisted to his feet and limped homeward. The lady stopped her horse immediately to enquire the extent of the mishap, but this did not seem to exert any great healing influence over the boy or the feelings of the indignant bystanders. How often must drivers be told that crossings are for pedestrians, and that reckless driving is a punishable offense.
