veracity enough in the community to have the laws carried out. It is a duty placed upon the military, which I suppose they do not require, nor desire.

This is the substance of the matter, and whatever requirement may be made by your honor I will comply with.

In relation to Mr. Daley I would say that the testimony is very slight, and it is quite common in capital cases where the testimony is slight to admit to bail. I therefore ask that he may be admitted to bail. He will give bail to any amount that the court sees proper.

Mr. Wilson said: I think that in capital cases it is customary that bail shall not be allowed, but if your honor shall be satisfied that upon a final hearing he will not be found guilty of murder you have the right to admit him to bail. As to what the laws are here in relation to bail I do not just now remember; this, however will come under the laws of the Territory, but it is for your honor to decide whether the evidence is such as to allow of his being admitted to bail.

In relation to turning these men over to the civil authorities, I will say that if there is any place for them, I think it is proper that they should be turned over to the civil authorities here.

The judge said in regard to the bail, it is true that the evidence does not show Mr. Daley to be a participant in the murder, but at the same time if the evidence be sufficient to bind over, then it will not admit of his being bailed. The fact of his having been connected with fetching in the bodies, the inquest &c., if there is sufficient evidence to bind over, then it is not ballable.

I will say in regard to the other matter that it is my intention and determination to commit them to the keeping of the marshal of this Territory. My mittimus will be directed to him, and I have nothing to do with it at all. He can keep them where he pleases; I have no right to dictate him as to where he shall keep them. He is the civil officer of this court.

Mr. Stout said, then it would be satisfactory to the court if there were any arrangements made with the marshal.

Judge: The court has nothing to do with it; the marshal can see to their safe keeping, and he can keep them where he sees cause, so that whatever is said can be said to the marshal.

Mr. Williams, attorney for the Parrish family, sued out a writ of attachment on the property of Aaron Johnson, and in favor of Mrs. Alvira L. Parrish. Claim \$500 with ten per cent interest thereon from the 14th March, 1857.

This writ was issued on the affidavit of Mrs. Parrish, who stated that her husband had a Territorial order, issued by Judge Drummond, on his person when murdered and that she believed it to be in the possession of Bishop Johnson.

Court adjourned until Monday at 8:30 a. m.

Since the 28th March, 25 persons have made a declaration of intention, and I received his full papers of citizenship.

MONDAY, April 4—8:30 a. m.

Court met as per adjournment.

Case of Alvira L. Parrish vs. Aaron Johnson; writ of attachment returned—having been served, Sunday the 31, on defendant's flouring mill. On motion of plaintiff's counsel, the case was continued.

John Daley and Hosea Stout having executed a bond of \$1,000. Mr. Daley was released on parole.

The Court made the following entry:—

This court has sought diligently, and faithfully to do its duty, to administer the laws of the United States and of this Territory. It could not have any other object. But at every turn it has had to encounter difficulties and embarrassments. Men high in authority in the Mormon Church, as well as men holding civil authority under the territorial government seem to have conspired to obstruct the course of public justice, and to cripple the earnest efforts of the court.

The whole community presents a united and organized opposition to the proper administration of justice; every art and every expedient have been employed to cover up and conceal crimes committed by Mormons. Witnesses have been prevented by threats of violence from obeying the summons of this court; others that have testified have been driven to seek safety in the protection of the United States troops stationed near here, who, it is proper to say, are here on the requisition of the court, and for whose presence the court is responsible. The absolute necessity of having these troops here has been fully demonstrated by all that has transpired during the session of the court.

To crown all, the grand jury, sworn to perform a high public duty, has lent itself as a willing instrument to this organized opposition to the laws of the country and refused to meet its obligations.

A most willing inclination has been manifested to prosecute Indians and other persons, not Mormons, for their offenses, while Mormon murderers and thieves are allowed to go unpunished.

This court determined, as its action manifests, that it did not intend to be used by this community for its protection alone, but that it will do justice to all, or it will do nothing.

Not being able to do this, the court now adjourns without day.
