Moths, he says, certainly do congregate in them, and a very little neglect makes the congregation too large for ordinary apiaries to survive. It is impossible to keep moth-worms from the hive. The moth will lay its eggs upon the alighting-board, and upon the blossoms daily visited by the bees. The eggs stick to the bee and are carried into the very centre of the hive. The only safety and the very best moth-trap is to keep the swarm strong. The weak swarm, or one without a queen, is the one that falls an easy prey to the moth. No more requisitions will be issued upon the inhabitants, and many of the Prussian officers decline to dine in houses upon which they are billetted, unless invited by their hosts, because they are now in receipt of their regular allowances. The Emperor will not go to Stuttgart or Munich, but will proceed direct to Ber-lin. General Goban leaves for Rouen to-morrow. The Prussian wounded have been sent home. It is expected that the first army corps will march in

three days. It is reported that Holland proposes a convention of powers to define contraband of war.
