

Some additional victims might fall on the side of order, but it should be remembered that they fall on the field of honor for the great good of their country.

The debate was continued on strict party lines, the socialists, Poles, and Alsacians opposing the bill.

Herr Bebel fruitlessly demanded that Bismarck be called to order for speaking of the socialists as bandits, and charging Fritzsche with falsehood. He made a personal explanation, insisting on the correctness of the statements he made yesterday, concerning Bismarck's relations with the socialists.

The house ultimately resolved, by a large majority, to refer the bill to a committee of 21 members.

PARIS 17.—The American Secretary of State telegraphs to Minister Noyes, acknowledging the receipt of \$6,000, the first installment of the contributions in France for the relief of the yellow fever sufferers.

The radical deputies have decided not to carry their protest against the suppression of the socialist congress in Grenelle district any further in consequence of a letter from Minister Dufaure, stating that the government had strictly observed the laws, but that it was inconvenient to discuss the affair, which was before the courts of Bosnia.

CITY OF MEXICO, 9.—It is reported that President Diaz has called Gomez to take charge of the department or go to Washington.

A conspiracy has been discovered amongst the officers of an infantry regiment. General Gonzales arrested the conspirators.

LONDON, 18.—Condon and Melody sailed, yesterday, in the steamer Moselle. Their embarkation was conducted with the utmost secrecy. The police and shipping agents denied all knowledge of their movements. The fact that they had embarked only became known late last night.

An envoy from the Ameer of Afghanistan has arrived here.

Advices received through insurmountable sources claim that the Austrians have been defeated near Zwoznick and Tuzla.

VIENNA, 18.—Gen. Szapary and the reinforcements which crossed the Save on the 14th inst., have commenced a combined action. They have occupied the important towns of Gradacac and Gracina, the latter unopposed. In Banjaluka district, Jajice and some adjacent villages have been burned. The insurgents defending them dispersed after prolonged fighting. The Austrians in these small engagements lost 150 men killed and wounded.

An Austrian battalion fell into an ambush between Trebinje and Bilek, and lost three officers and 80 men. The adjutant general of the navy is missing.

Count Von Schouvaloff left the city rather suddenly. He doubtless found Count Andassy indisposed to listen to his propositions.

The advance against Bihaco has been resumed with a strong force. Pesther Lloyd, heretofore a loyal supporter of Count Andassy, raises its voice against the reported Austro-Servia-Montenegro alliance, which that journal declared would be a slap at the face of Hungary, and it takes the opportunity of this reputed intention on his part to repudiate Count Andassy's Bosnian policy.

Another account says that Ristic, the Serbian premier, offered the co-operation of Serbia, but it was declined, and the Vienna cabinet has given it to be understood that they never entertained the idea of accepting such an arrangement.

PESTH, 18.—The council of the Smogy district has refused to lend wagons to the army. It has also passed a resolution demanding the indictment of Premier Tisza for promoting occupation.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 18.—General Todleben will probably see the Czar at Livadia, about the end of this week or the beginning of next, by which time San Stefano ought to be evacuated.
