City Food Inspector Frazier is after the dairymen who are using viscogen, a composition of sugar, water and lime, which gives consistency to cream after sterilization. According to law, all dairy products containing this mixture must be labeled as containing "viscoe," which is not being done. When used in very small quantities, there is no danger, but where the cream passes through several hands before reaching the consumer, and each handler adds "viscoe" there is apt to be trouble be trouble.

#### Demurrer of State of Utah Sustained By Judge Ritchie.

In the case of the Black Rock Min ing company against the State of Utah the demurrer of the defendant was sustained by Judge Ritchie in the district court yesterday. The decision is of con-siderable interest throught the state, as it in effect says that the act of the legislature in the matter of a corpora-tion tax is constitutional and binding.
