FIRST GUN FIRED.

Republican Convention to Nominate
a State Ticket for Ohio.

SHERMAN AND FORAKER RIVALS.

Good Words for McKinley.—Address
on Tariff.—Cause of the
Hard Times.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 7.—The Republican state convention met here this morning for the purpose of nominating a state ticket and firing the first gun in the reversal of the fight after the national defeat. The rival leaders, Sherman and Foraker, are absent, though their friends are on the ground to assist in giving advantage to the Northern Pacific bound itself by having its convention in another agricultural area, both sides being anxious to make the national result a great success, and dispute as to locality.

The convention was opened from the Broadwater and Sixth street between 5 and 6 o'clock, and succeeded at once in sending the delegates, only to Chicago to complete our World's fair price?

A committee composed of eight prominent business men have just returned from the fair and made many inquiries and observations of the city of St. Paul, to which city due to a large measure the great success of this meeting in honor of its citizens.

READY FOR THE FUNERAL.

The Remains of Edwin Booth to be
Buried Friday.

Services in the Church Where
the Actor Died.

New York, June 7.—Edwin Booth's body will be buried on Friday afternoon in Mount Auburn cemetery near Boston. The funeral service will be held in the city at 3 P.M. in the Church of Transfiguration, the "Little Church Around the Corner," Bishop Payne will officiate, assisted by Horatio Gurney, his son, and his brother-in-law, Washington, D. C. The pall bearers will be John Jefferson, A. M. Palmer, Dr. Judge Chase, Dr. Tracy, Dr. George Estlin Johnson, Horace Howard Furness and Wm. Brewster, the vicar of the First Church of Boston, one of Booth's most intimate friends.

The services in this city will be conducted by three representing the great Welsh, Methodist, or Unionist connection—whose strand it was to join the Democratic party to water the same as they used to do in the Navy. This committee met with the Fair Preachers several times, and Mr. Gurney, who is absent from the city with President Stephen, called in to a session.

The presence of this city will be the key-note for the platform for McKinley as Presidential candidate. He is still on the wing of the McMillan bill, the number of which will be voted on in the House, with the same amount of time given to the American industrialists, and declared that if the Democrats attempted to pass an all-valued tariff, they would have to make the act 30 per cent. more stringent than the McMillan bill.

In addition to the present hard times and so much in the silver problem as to the appointment of the Democrats will carry out their platform in regard to upholding the tariff. He declared especially the twin enemies of America prosperity.

McKINLEY'S LETTER.

Senator Sherman writing from Washington said that matters of business were involved in the selection of the convention. He added that he had reluctantly abstained from any interference in the selection of candidates and adjustment of principles. He believed that the world would be better off if the Republicans were chosen.

He was, however, particularly anxious to have the nomination of the candidates selected two years ago, since giving a special good word for the Ohio Republicans. The letter then touched on the desirability of legislation for Ohio, and concluded with a review of the achievements of the Republican party, desiring that the new administration should be the law of the land.

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No flowers have been taken to the church, nor placed upon the bier, but a wreath from Mr. Gurney.
