women did not attempt to jump. At a point opposite the Rio Grande Western freight house the buggy collided with a spring wagon in front of a blacksmith shop, breaking both wheels on the right side entirely from the axle. They were picked up and carried into the blacksmith shop, where they soon recovered from the stunned condition and were taken to their homes, where they were given medical treatment. ANSWERS WIFE'S COMPLAINT.

CITY SHOULD OWN PUBLIC UTILITIES

So Declares Dr. Chas. G. Plummer, Republican Candidate For Mayor.

"COLLECTIVE INSANITY."

Senator Sutherland Declares "American" Party Shows Increasing Symptoms of It.

The "reform" administration in vogue in Salt Lake City, was discussed by Dr. Chas. G. Plummer, Republican candidate for mayor, at a Republican rally held last night in the Ladies' Literary club.

Dr. Plummer explained how the reformers looked to him, and in his denunciations declared that they showed symptoms of badly needing reform themselves.

"There are too many hands in the bag," he said, "too many people engaged in the business of trying to run the city, and there is always complaint from those who get the last grab. I favor simplifying the city government, and public ownership of public utilities."

The rally is the first of the campaign held by the Republican party. It was presided over by E. D. R. Thompson, and was attended mostly by voters in the Fifth precinct, being given under the auspices of the Women's Republican club at a Fifth ward rally.

The speakers were Dr. Plummer, Senator Geo. Sutherland, E. O. Leathers, John P. Meakin, E. D. R. Thompson, and Henry Cohen. The speech-making was preceded by music from the Republican quartet, and followed by refreshments, served in the supper room.

Dr. Plummer, who was announced as the speaker, spoke on governmental principles, declaring that the city government of any city was just as good as the people who represent it. He said, "that we have to wait six or eight months to get a balance from the city treasurer's books. Why can't we have a balance every night if it is desired?"

"If a voter goes to the city and county building to ask what is the balance in the city treasury he is told by some tax-dollor clerk to get out. These reformers need reforming."

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP.

Dr. Plummer continued at length upon the principles of free government, holding that every administration ought to be able to invite the people to help it. "I believe in public ownership of public utilities," he declared. "I believe the city should own its electric light and its own street railway system. If the city owned its own utilities there would never come a time when a franchise would be held up a year before it was granted."

SENATOR SUTHERLAND.

Senator Sutherland said that he had been trying to find out what was wrong with the "American" party and had found that it was afflicted with collective insanity. "Whichever," he declared, "is a case of lunacy that has long since gone into limbo, but the modern style of brainstorming in this locality is hysterical. When anything happens in Salt Lake we have a self-righteous set of lunatics who own, manage and control the Salt Lake Tribune with its hired prevaricators and censor agents who proceed to publish a complaint of everything that is done. These people are not satisfied with abusing those who disagree with them, but they abuse the people they abuse uniting together to abate a nuisance."

DUTY FOR DECENT MEN.

"It would be the patriotic duty of every decent-thinking man to beat that sort of an aggregation," he declared, "and that is my condition. It is a poor rule that won't work both ways. This party called 'American' is engaged in a campaign that declares in substance and effect that no Mormon or Jack-Mormon—and by that they mean people who believe that the rights of Mormons are as sacred as those of others, and those who are loyal to their own consciences—that no Mormon or Jack-Mormon need apply."

AN ABSURD CHARGE.

"I believe it is the duty of the people of this city, whether they call themselves Republicans, Democrats, Socialists or otherwise, to unite and beat that sort of 'American' party," he declared. "The 'American' party declares that the Republicans and Democrats are under the domination of the Mormon Church, a statement I believe, and which I know reputable men of all parties believe to be absolutely and absurdly false."

FUSION IS PATRIOTIC.

"So long as this 'American' party is in existence, we cannot have national politics in Salt Lake in any sense, but they must be gotten out of the way first. Get together and beat the political life out of this organization at the polls in November. The 'American' party is a common enemy and the common villain of both old political parties."

MEAKIN'S VIEW.

John P. Meakin attacked the "American" party as an unpatriotic institution, declaring that it followed an ungodly code in life and made friends with all that is bad and unwholesome. E. O. Leathers followed with a declaration of the "American" party as a party of negation and Henry Cohen told how he intended to conduct himself in office if elected. The rally was attended by about 100 people.

BIGAMY ALLEGED.

George S. Best Accused of Marrying More Than One Woman.
George S. Best, who was recently here as a vaudeville actor, may have to face the charge of bigamy. When he was here, in December of 1905, he married Miss Anita Smith. In Los Angeles he claimed that the marriage here was a mock ceremony, and that the two were not really married. He admitted living with his Salt Lake wife, however. These representations were made to Miss Cecile Fleming and she was convinced. The two went to Santa Ana secretly and were married. The above information comes from Los Angeles. The prosecutor there is seeking information regarding the man's activities in the matrimonial field as evidence to be used in his trial.


