TREE INSPECTOR REPORTS.

More Than 75,000 Fumigations Made During April, 3,000 Contaminations.

John P. Robinson, horticultural inspector for Salt Lake county, has rendered his report for the month of April just closed. The report shows that nearly 75,000 fruit trees were fumigated and inspected during the month, and nearly 3,000 were condemned on account of being diseased.

Orchards cleaned this spring, 559, orchards pruned, 450; orchards winter sprayed, 60; old trees cut down, 360; pear trees cut out for blight, 3,220; young trees planted, 23,543; orchards visited, 646. In one district southwest of Jordan six large California apricot pumps, costing over \$50 apiece, have been bought and started to work, and many farmers intend to take hold of fruit raising in a manner to produce results.

CHARGES DURESS.

A parcel of land deeded by the late Jane E. James to her daughter, Mrs. Ellen McLean, was made the ground of a suit filed in the district court yesterday by Sylvester James, son of the grantor and brother of the grantee. James alleges that his mother was not in sound mind when she executed the instrument, and that she was over-persuaded in the matter by her son.

PISTOL GUIDED PEN.

The suit of William Rees against F. H. Harrison, executor of the estate of David Rees, which has engaged the attention of Judge Ritchie in the district court, was compromised yesterday for \$1,000. The amount claimed by the plaintiff was \$6,100.

GREEKS BOUND OVER.

John Katsoulakis and Mathias Galanakis, the two Greeks charged with turning a switch on the O. S. L. and the former alleged that the latter, at yesterday afternoon the preliminary hearing of the defendants came to a close in Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith's court and they were ordered held to await the action of the district court.

SALOON CASES CONTINUED.

The saloon cases which came before Judge C. B. Dyer yesterday afternoon were continued until Monday. The defendants are charged with selling liquor on Sunday and the chief of police claims that the city has a good case against them. The accused were represented by Atty. Soren X. Christensen and S. P. Armstrong, and James F. Smith represents one of the defendants.

ON STATUTORY GROUNDS.

Hubert A. Jenkins was granted a divorce from his wife, Mabel Fernora Jenkins yesterday on statutory grounds by Judge Armstrong. The case was tried April 13, and the court found the wife guilty of desertion and other charges were sustained. The couple were married at Farmington Nov. 22, 1907, and on Dec. 16, 1907, while at a hotel in Salt Lake, Mrs. Jenkins deserted plaintiff and went away with another man, who claimed here as his wife.

DIVORCE GRANTED.

Judge Armstrong this morning granted a decree of divorce in the case of Ruth E. Wiswell vs. Fredrick A. Wiswell, on the ground of failure to provide. The parties were married in this city Oct. 2, 1901. The wife claims Wiswell makes \$20 per month, and asked for \$25 per month alimony and costs, which the decree carried.

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DEATH OF JOHN REDMAN.

John Redman, a respected resident of Big Cottonwood, died this morning at his late home, from cerebral spinal meningitis. The deceased was a native of England, and was 56 years of age at the time of his death. He is survived by a widow and six children.
