## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Skating Party**—The Gordon academy pupils held a skating party last night at the rink, with 50 skaters, who afterwards indulged in a lunch.

**Has Twenty-two Lines**—Kent O. Keyes is now in this territory for 22 Vanderbilt lines. Mr. Keyes will soon have to use bill boards for business cards.

**Ill at Los Angeles**—A dispatch was received from Los Angeles last night that the proprietor of the Knutsford Hotel was ill with typhoid, and the hotel is being run by a sister at the Angelus hotel. His early recovery is looked for, however.

**Funeral of A. Holmberg**—At the Granger ward meetinghouse on Sunday, commencing at 10 o'clock, will occur the funeral of Abraham Holmberg, who was killed at Lark Twp. day in the mill of the Ohio Copper company. The remains will be interred in the city cemetery.

**State to Build Reservoir**—The state board yesterday set aside \$29,000 for the building of a water reservoir 15 miles from Marysville, where nature has already provided for a storage basin with hills on three sides of the state. The plans for the reservoir provide for the storage of 90,000,000 feet of water and will irrigate 20,000 acres of arid land.

**Humane Officer Reports**—Bullets and cremation for 1,145 dogs and the rest cure for 462 horses show the greater portion of the work for the humane officer during the year according to the report he filed with Mayor Bransford yesterday. Seven arrests were made for cruelty to animals and three for neglect. Penalties were secured in each instance.

It was announced that the society had contributed \$500 towards the building fund of the new church.

**Knights Take Care of Him**—William Hollenshead of Wadsworth, Wash., an elderly man who was found wandering around Murray recently, "unknown to himself," and placed for safe keeping in the county jail, was taken out by the Knights of Pythias, to which order he belonged, prior to being returned to his home. Hollenshead suffered from a stroke of the head 18 months ago, and that, with the loss of a leg, left him mind unbalanced.

## PRESIDENT DAVIS NAMES COMMITTEES

Black Loses a Choice Assignment on the Engineering Committee.

### INNER CIRCLE SHOWS COLOR

Because Party Member from the Fifth Opposed Halloran He Fares Poorly in Honors.

President Arthur J. Davis of the city council has announced his committee assignments and the announcement has created no end of comment. Councilman Black was formerly chairman of the council committees on engineering and sewerage, election, city and county building and a member of the committees on improvements, streets, finance, fire department, claims, cemetery, sprinkling and sanitary. Truly, before Black took his stand against W. J. Halloran, the candidate of the inner circle for mayor at the time Mayor Thompson resigned, he was a man mixed in almost every department of the city's affairs. The assignment of the committee on the city and county building, however, but the memory of man does not go back so far as to recall when this committee had any work to do. The inner circle is "agin Tom."

A new committee, which is really a board provided for by a recently passed ordinance, is found in the assignment. ## RETURNS TO LOS ANGELES.

Ex-Dean Eddie Will Rejoin His Family—Claims He Is Innocent.

Ex-Dean and ex-Rev. J. B. Eddie of St. Mark's cathedral left last night, for Los Angeles where he will rejoin his family, having been deposed from the Episcopal ministry, as already noted in the papers. His counsel, Ellis, Dickson & Schuller, are emphatic in their declaration that the man is entirely innocent of the charges made against him, and say that had the case been tried in civil court, the testimony would have been thrown out of court as incompetent and irrelevant. But in an ecclesiastical court, methods of procedure are very different. Exceptions don't go; neither do objections, and attorneys are entirely at the mercy of the court. Comments by counsel on the proceedings, if printed, would read like some Fourth of July speeches during the Civil war with lurid additions.
