# EPOCH IN RUSSIAN HISTORY.

Principle of Autocracy is Not Involved -Emperor Anxieus for Welfare Of His Subjects.

St. Petersburg, March 3 .- In the Alexander palace at Tsarskoe-Selo, surrounded by the ministers and a few members of the court, and with the empress at his side, Emperor Nicholas this afternoon affixed his signature to a rescript containing his majesty's decree to give elected representatives of the people an opportunity to express their views in the preparation of the laws of the empire.

TEXT OF THE RESCRIPT.

Following is the text of the rescript: Following is the text of the rescript: "True to the ancient custom of the Russian people of the expression of its feelings to the throne in days of joy or sorrow for the fatherland, the nobili-ty, zemstvo assemblies, commercial as-sociations and peasant communities have offered from all parts of Russia congratulations on the birth of the heir to the throne, with expressions of their willingness to sacrifice their fortunes for the successful termination of the war and to devote all their strength to the establishment of order in the state. In my own name and in that of her majesty, I order you to convey to them our hearty thanks for the expression of majesty, 1 order you to convey to them our hearty thanks for the expression of their loyal feeling, which in the present very grave times, is all the more pleas-ing as an expression of their willing-ness, at my call, to co-operate in the successful execution of the reforms an-mounced by me, and is entirally to no successful execution the trief of the ac-cordance with the wishes of my heart, "My desire is to attain the fulfilment of my intentions for the welfare of my people by means of the co-operation of the government with experienced forces the government with experienced forces of the community and, continuing the work of my crowned ancestors, to re-tain the prestige of the Russian nation undiminished and to maintain order therein. I am resolved henceforth, with the help of God, to convene the worthiest men possessing the confidence of the people and elected by them to partiipate in the elaboration and consideran of legislative measures. "Taking into consideration the pecu-liar circumstances of the fatherland, the multiplicity of its races, and, in certain parts of the country, the weak development of citizenship, Russian rulers in their wisdom instituted re-forms in accordance with their mature requirements, but only in logical se-quence, at the same time considering the continuation of firm historical thes with the past as a pledge for the dur-ability and stability of the present. MANIFESTO AND RESCRIPT.

"The manifesto and the rescript must be read together. To Americans the former doubtless will appear as a strange mediaeval document; but it must be remembered that it is the em-peror's word to his people in every condition of life, scattered from the White sea to the Black sea, and from the frontiers of Germany to the Pa-clife. It will be read in every church, in every hamilet of the empire. It is a personal appeal to the people to sup-port the government in its hour of trial, and should be read in that light. The rescript, on the other hand, is ad-dressed to the minister of the interior. Under the Russian law, only nobles have the right to address memorials to his majesty in person. All other class-es must communicate through the minister of the interior. The rescript, therefore, must be regarded as his must be remembered that it is the em autocracy is involved for the present,

At the some time it recognizes the principle of the people's right to be heard regarding laws under which they must live. Whatever the recult may be, the document is sure to mark an epoch in Russian history as important as the signing of the emonopation manifesto, the twenty-fourth anniver-sary of which it was intended to sig-nalize. therefore, must be regarded as his majesty's reply to the vast number of adresses adopted by zemstvos, mu-nicipalities, educational, commercial and professional associations, and even communes."

# NO ARRESTS HAVE BEEN MADE.

Miss Berner Denies That She Ever Suspected Ab Wing, the Chinese Cook.

San Francisco, March 3 .- Although every effort is being made to solve the mystery of the alleged poisoning of Mrs. Jane L. Stanford in Honolulu, there were few developments in the case today. The autopsy in Honolulu has not been completed, and it has not been proven that death did not result from natural causes. A cablegram from Honoiulu intimates that an acute attack of indigestion may have caused

attack of indigestion muy have caused the fatal illness of Mrs. Stanford, who, before dying, recalled the previous sto-ries of an attempt on her life, and ex-claimed that she had been poisoned. As yet no arrests have been made, and the detectives engaged in Invsti-gating the matter have made no direct accusations, though the various mem-bers of the Stanford household are un-derstood to be closely watched.

bers of the Stanford household are un-defstood to be closely watched. With reference to those suspected by the authorities, Capt. Callundan of the Morse detective agency said today: "At the present moment we have positively no proof that would hold any one for the poisoning of Mrs. Stan-ford. We do not suspect Ah Wing, the Chinese cook, and he is not under greater surveillance than the others in the Stanford mansion today. "We cannot take any action until the report of the autopsy reaches us from Honolulu." It has been learned that W. E. Jack-

from Honolulu." It has been learned that W. E. Jack-son, head pharmacist at the Stanford pharmacy in Palo Alto, sold Mrs. Stan-ford a package of blearbonate of soda on the 6th of February. Mrs. Stanford and her secretary. Miss Berner, had just returned from the Hotel Vendome at San Jose, and came directly from the train to the drug store. They were helped from their carriage and entered the store. They purchased several drugs and toilet articles, among them being 10 cents' worth of blearbonate of drugs and toilet articles, among them being 10 cents' worth of bicarbonate of soda. The package was wrapped up, labeled and given to Miss Berner with the other articles. Mr. Jackson has placed the remainder of the bottle of bicarbonate of soda, from which the package was sold, in the keeping of his attorney, Walter Rogers, and refuses to be interviewed. be interviewed.

The report of the San Francisco chemist who analyzed the mineral wa-ter of which Mrs. Stanford drank on Jan. 14. made public today, declares that there was strychnine in the wa-ter submitted to him for examination. President Jordan of the Leland Stan-ford, Jr., university, in company with the relatives and friends of Mrs. Stan-ford, was reluctant to believe that she was poisoned. was poisoned.

She says that, acting on the advice of the police authorities and her attorney, she will not make any

High Sheriff Henry says he is quite positive Miss Berner never made such a statement, and adds that he has had several prolonged conversations with her.

#### DR. JORDAN'S VIEWS.

Stanford University, Cal., March 3.--President Jordan of the Stanford uni-versity still has hope that Mrs. Stan-ford met her death by accident, and not by wilful poisoning. He asserted to-day that he had absolutely no theory as to who could have a motive for killing Mrs. Stanford, and that he did not believe that any of the servants

killing Mrs. Stanford, and that he did not believe that any of the servants would do the deed. "The poisoned drug must have come from the same bottle that poisoned the mineral water in San Francisco in January. I do not believe that the murderer, if there is one, followed Mrs. Stanford to Honolulu. When the will is made public the motive may be re-vealed, but at present I have no theory."
