LOCAL BRIEFS.

Meeting of Doctors—Some 35 local medics met last night at the Commercial club to listen to Prof. Leland of Carlsbad, Germany, who is in town for a few days while on route across the continent.

More Property Sold—Meeks & Lynch report the sale of 95x125 feet on Main between Sixth and Seventh South streets, the E. Picknell property to Bertha M. Jackson of Los Angeles for \$13,000.

Gibson Named—At yesterday's meeting of the Wilson Sherman company, George Jay Gibson was chosen vice president in place of E. W. Wilson removed to San Francisco, though Mr. Wilson remains in the territory.

Funeral Tomorrow—The funeral of James White, the volunteer fireman veteran, will be held tomorrow at 1:30 p. m., from the residence, 724 East South Temple street, with interment in the City cemetery.

Blanks Sent Out—Secy. of State Tingoy today mailed to all insurance companies doing business in this state regular annual statement blanks calling for a general statement of the business done by the companies.

Unpaved Alley—President C. A. Quigley and Manager Fisher Harris of the Commercial club wrote to the mayor yesterday, calling his attention to the disgraceful condition of the unpaved alleys, and asking that steps be taken to enforce the ordinance providing for paving the city alleys.

News of Investments—Henry Peery is back from Los Angeles, and says that the news of Mr. Newhouse's investments created a sensation in the Angel city, and there were many inquiries for Mr. Newhouse. Mr. Peery believes it will bring much capital and business enterprise into this city.

Caldwell Home Sold—Theodore Tolman has bought six acres at Seventh East and Thirteenth South streets, including the old Caldwell homestead, from the Salt Lake Sanitarium company and George Caldwell, for \$10,000. What will be done with the property is not known, as the new proprietor has not yet made up his mind.

Fees Received—The fees of the office of Secy. of State Tingoy yesterday amounted to the total sum of \$1,246. This amount was paid to the office as filing fees for two new incorporations. The companies are the Pacific Fruit Express company, capitalized at \$12,000,000, and Yerington Central Copper company with a capital stock of \$5,000,000.

Landenberger, were thrown out and badly shaken up as a result of a runaway at First and D streets yesterday afternoon. Vetoed by Mayor—The resolution introduced by Councilman O'Donnell and authorizing the board of health to close up alleys and streets in the business district of the city that are not paved within 60 days from notice, has been vetoed by Mayor Thompson. The mayor states that it is impossible to close up alleys and streets in the business district of the city that are not paved within 60 days from notice, as the passage of the resolution would be unjust.

RATE QUESTION UP FOR DISCUSSION

Matter of Adjusting Them Receives Attention From M. & M. A.

TO SUPPORT HEYBURN BILL.

Message Asking for Their Help Has Been Sent to Utah's Delegation At Washington.

The matter of adjusting freight rates for Utah has long been a vital problem with the M. & M. association of this city, and last night it was the subject of an executive committee session.

The business men of the association feel that since the railroads seem to be waiting to be forced into line, the only policy left is to do what La Follette did in Wisconsin, and become as well versed as possible in the details of the freight rate question.

For that reason Orvin Morris was employed some time ago as an expert on the question, he having been for a long time employed in that line of work by local roads. Since then the case has been in progress of preparation for the Manufacturers and Merchants' association, and the action last night represents one phase of the matter.

It was decided to support in any practical way the proposed Heyburn bill, soon to be brought before Congress. This bill will give the western states the advantage of the long haul which now discriminates against this region in favor of the Pacific coast, and makes it cheaper to ship from the east to San Francisco and back than it is to ship here direct.

The following message supporting the measure was last night telegraphed to Senator Reed Smoot, Senator George Sutherland, Senator Robert La Follette, and to Congressman Joseph Howell:

"We earnestly ask your co-operation for legislation as is proposed by Senator Heyburn's amendment to the railroad act, giving the advantage of the long haul rates to intermountain points.

The following message was also sent to Senator Heyburn:

"We heartily approve your proposed amendment to the railway rate law, giving the advantage of the long haul to inferior points and have asked our representatives in Congress to co-operate with you."

Another phase of the association's work consists of an attempt to treat with the railroads direct in securing a reduction of freight rates for this region, by a general dropping of one class in the system of classifying freights, each class of freight to take the rate now provided for the class below it.
