TO CAPTURE.

An Oregon Fugitive From Justice Commits Suicide,

HE IMITATED HARRY TRACY

Having Been Wounded by a Pursuing Posse He Turns Revolver on Himself, Sending Bullet in Head.

Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 5 .- Edward White, the fugitive trusty recently escaped from the Oregon penitentiary, imitating the noted outlaw, Harry Tracy, killed himself yesterday near Eddyville, 30 miles west of Corvallis, after having been wounded by the posse in pursuit. The body was brought here at noon today en route to the penitentiary for burial.

In the encounter White had been brought to his knees with a shot through the body, and in that position placed his 44-caliber Colt's revolver to his own forehead and sent a builet crashing through his brain. The fight happened within a few yards of the house of Robert Warnick.

After an encounter with Sheriff Ross Sunday, near Waldport, White worked his way back to the Yaquima river, having been seen at a schoolhouse near Chitwood early Tuesday morning. Offi-cers were on the trail. As Warnick was passing along the railroad with a section gang he observed White at some distance in the county road. The latter secreted himself in the bushes and the party passed on to a distance of 150 yards, where Warnick took the back trail.

Soon after White appeared in the lane approaching Warnick's house, where a saddled horse was tied. Warnick commanded him to halt, but White presented his revolver but did not fire. The officer leveled his Winchester and White wheeled and ran toward the horse. As he attempted to mount a bullet from the rifle tore through White's clothing. This caused the convict to change his plan, and he left the horse and ran toward the Warnick barn. Then a shot from the officer's rifle struck him, entering the small of the back and coming out four inches above the naval. He staggered and fell to his knees. Placing his revolver to his forehead, White fired. He fell forward and died in five minutes.

BANKRUPTCY LAW. President Signs Bill Amending That Of 1898

Washington, Feb. 5,-The president late this afternoon signed the bill which amends the bankruptcy law of 1898.

The bill modifies the existing law in several important particulars, the principal one of which is a provision in regard to preferred reeditors. Under the existing jaw those who had received payments from a person who had soon afterward been declared bankrupt could not have other claims passed upon without surrendering the amount received. This change is in conformlty with a decision of the supreme court. Another amendment provides that the appointment of a receiver for a corporation which is insolvent is an act of bankruptcy entitling the creditors to choose their own trustees. Another important change is one which gives the federal court concurrent jurisdiction of suits to recover property which has been fraudulently transferred. Other amendments allow the wives of bankrupts to testify in the proceedings; pro-vide for an increase of the fees of referees and trustees to an average of about 50 per cent over the fees allowed by the present law, and prohibit the courts from allowing greater fees than the law permits in any case and add to the list of debts from which a bank-rupt cannot be relieved by a discharge from bankruptcy. The new law in-cludes debts to wife and children and allmony. The list of corporations which may go into bankruptcy is mereased by


