These cars are not havens of absolute safety, but are expected to minimize the danger which al. ways attends the approach of the stretcher men to the firing line. These me being noncombatants and influenced only by motives of mercy, should be afforded every protection that is possible. This car was tested at Bisley, England, and it made such a favorable impression that more will be constructed and sen to ald the Red Cross workers in the east.

LARGEST DERRICK CRANE IN THE WORLD. THE REAL STREET, STREE



The largest floating derrick crane in the world is in the New York navy yard. It is of 100 tons capacity and is supplemented by another crane of sixty tons. The huge crane is ninety feet in height and is sixty-five feet above the water. It is built on pontoons, and the overhang of its arm is forty-five feet. At a recent trial of its power it lifted the turrets from the battleship Indiana with apparent ease. This crane is sure to be of great service in equipping the big warships which will be constructed during the next few years.
