benefit of his posterity after him. He was the husband of four wives, three of whom had passed away before him. He was the father of fifteen children, eleven of whom are still alive. He also had fourteen grand children. He has well and faithfully performed every labor assigned him. He sought not the riches of this earth, but to lay up treasures in heaven; and has now gone to the paradise of God to await the morning of the first resurrection.


