

TELEGRAPHIC. A THOUSAND KILLED

By a Cyclone That Stoops Down Upon
St. Louis.

FIRE ADDS HORROR TO THE SCENE.

Death and Desolation on Land and Water—An Oppressor Day and an Awful Night.

CINCINNATI, May 27.—One of the greatest disasters of recent years overwhelmed the city of St. Louis tonight in the shape of a cyclone. When the gales shortly after 6 o'clock had their fury minus, how it went by through the city with a velocity of over eighty miles an hour. Although reports now are very meager owing to the almost total destruction of the telegraph wires, it seems certain the number of dead and wounded will amount to fully 1,000 and the damage due to millions of dollars. Twenty-five thousand houses were entirely destroyed, fire, flood, and inundation covering the ground in floodwater with mud, mire, and children, and the morgue within two hours after the end of the storm was full of victims of the cyclone and its results.

In addition to those who were killed in their houses and streets, hundreds are beneath the waters of the Mississippi river. Of all the scenes in the lower water which have been witnessed, none can equal the one at St. Louis. All the others have given way, in many instances every soul aboard being lost and in others not over two of three being able to reach a place of safety.

The boats destroyed is the excursion steamer Great Republic, one of the largest steamers on the lower river. Not a man escaped from her, and it is said she was crowded with excursionists.

The greater part of the city is a wreck. Many buildings have been demolished and others partially wrecked. The streets are utterly impassable to street cars, and in many places houses, boats, and other articles are floating about in the mud.

At the height of the night, the electric light plants were rendered incapable of service and the gas lamps are also out, leaving the city in total darkness.

The cyclone broke out in several portions of the city, and the fire department was unable to make any effective fight because of the choked up condition of the streets and the large number of firemen who were engaged in the work of removing the dead and wounded.

At least 100 houses were destroyed, 1000 windows broken, 1000 doors broken, and 1000 trees uprooted. The damage done to property is estimated at \$10,000,000.

St. Louis were on fire and burning furiously, but could not put out more than a few feet. It had not been able to get away from the water, but the water had gone, and the fire was still burning.

On all of the roads between this city and St. Louis, except those never mentioned, the houses and trees were laid low by the wind and many houses of St. Louis in a hurry to reach their homes and obtain higher knowledge of the result of the storm and the safety of their loved ones, had to leave the city, but St. Louis had been caught in the general trap.

Mr. Louis, May 28.—The wind and destruction may supreme in St. Louis and vicinity continues a road of desolation from the Alton road here to a point west of the city, where the wind has blown down every tree and fence, and every building, house, barn, stable, and other structure, for miles.

At 10 a.m. the wind was about 50 miles in the afternoon, after a most severe gale, but still day and night, to fall. The winds developed into fierce thunderstorms, with the winds from the east. A terrible gale, which reached a maximum of eighty miles an hour, driving the rain before it and tearing roofs, windows, and everything in its way.

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
