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

OMAHA, Nov. 8.—Complete returns from sixteen counties, including Douglas and Lancaster, give Harrison 24,013, Claveland 26,505. For governor Mc-Bittle leads his ticket 2200, In 1884 the same countles gave Biaine 22,250, Claveland 17,801 Cleveland 17,301.


