ALLEN RETURNS FROM WASHINGTON

Mining Man Expresses Hope That Tariff on Lead Ores Will Not Be Disturbed.

SEES SOME DANGER, HOWEVER

Yet Interests of Mining Industry Will Be Carefully Guarded in Halls of Congress.

Clarence E. Allen, mines manager of the United States Smelting, Refining & Mining company, returned last evening from Washington, D. C., where he went with C. E. Looser of Provo to represent the lead mining interests of Utah before the house ways and means committee in the discussion of the present tariff schedule.

"Of course," said Mr. Allen today, "I do not know what the committee is going to do, or what will be the final outcome in this matter of reducing the duty on lead ores; but one thing is certain that if the present schedule is reduced it will not be to the benefit of the lead mine owner and when it affects the mine owner, it would naturally affect the smelters. Nevertheless, it is to be hoped that Congress will take it as it applies to lead ores alone."

"It appears to me that the greatest danger lies in some radical re-arrangement being made and that in the heat of the discussion of matters pertaining to the tariff, lead might have worse than we all hope it will. Members of Congress may see instances where the duty on certain commodities is higher than it ought to be and in the excitement draw in other commodities where the tariff is low enough. Yet the interests of the west will not be without strong support in the halls of Congress at the proper time."

Mr. Allen, says Chairman Payne of the ways and means committee rather informed during the proceedings that he favored some slight reduction, but just how other members of the committee will look at the matter he does not pretend to know. The present duty on lead ores shipped into this country is 1 1/2 cents a pound.

While in the east Mr. Allen visited

with his mother and daughter for a few days, the latter being in school at Cleveland, Ohio. After leaving Washington Mr. Looser went to New York on business.
