

that another Czar of Russia was crowned. The cathedral choir sang the Te Deum, after which the Emperor ungirded his sword, accompanied by the Empress. Numerous dignitaries proceeded to the sanctuary. There the Metropolitan of Novgorod anointed the Emperor's forehead, eyes, nostrils, lips, ears, breast and hands at the same time exclaiming: "The seal of the Holy Spirit, May it keep thee ever holy." The Empress was anointed only on the forehead. Both partook of sacrament and then left the cathedral wearing their crowns and scepters, the Emperor also bearing sceptre and orb. After praying in the Cathedral of Michael, the angels, their majesties returned to the palace, escorted by a procession which presented even a more splendid sight than that which escorted them to the cathedral. The procession was now augmented by the state carriages of the imperial family. Banners waved from all parts of the Kremlin. The whole route of the procession was brightly lit with flags and hangings. The Emperor and Empress, preceded by the celebrated Staircase whence the laws were promulgated. There they turned and saluted the people. Immediately uncovered their cheering enthusiastically and sang the Czar.

The imperial banquet began, at 10 p.m. in the hall called the Privy Palace. This hall was newly restored for the occasion and was splendidly decorated with gold. The Emperor and Empress, wearing their crowns and scepters, sat on thrones of unusual height. Their majesties were surrounded by distinguished nobles, as cupbearers, carvers, etc. The first toast was, "His Majesty the Emperor," which was followed by 81 guns; the next was "His Majesty the Empress," followed by 51 guns. The third was "Imperial Household," followed by 31 guns, and the fourth was "Clergy and all faithful subjects," followed by 21 guns. Foreign princes and diplomatists stood during the first toast and afterward, in accordance with ancient custom, withdrew to separate repast. The weather was throughout the day and evening, passed off successfully. Tokens in memory of the Emperor's manifesto were issued in the evening, and is a document of considerable length. Crowds gathered at the printing office to obtain copies of the perusal of which was of great rejoicing.

BLIN, 28.—Michael Fagan, charged at Kilmainham jail this morning. 28.—A dispatch from Saigon yesterday, says: Captain was reconnoitering with 400 men near the landing from the French vessels when he was attacked. The party was assaulted by 400 kilometres from Hue by a body of the enemy, principally pirates, and was compelled to retreat. Total loss 28 killed and 51 wounded. Saturday's telegram gives number of killed and wounded only to the loss among sailors. Troops subsequently retook the positions, additional forces being hurried forward from aboard merchant vessels. A dispatch from Saigon says: It is generally believed that it will be necessary to bombard Hue and a strong expedition to Ton-

kin. The Minister of marine sent a telegram ordering the Governor of China, to notify the French that the Chamber of Deputies has unanimously passed a Tonkin expedition and that France will send her glorious children. Two divisions of ironclads and a cruiser ordered to proceed east directly.

THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE. The East Tennessee Conference was held at this place beginning at 10 a.m. Missionaries present B. H. Roberts of the presidency of the Southern States Mission; President Louis Kelch and James A. Eldredge of the Kentucky Conference; and President Samuel Jackson and Elders H. Joseph, Joseph B. Hunter,

Thomas Godfrey, Thomas Griffin, Jacob F. Miller, and Brigham A. Holbrook of the East Tennessee Conference.

After opening exercises President Jackson advised all to consider that though men have claimed that the manifestations of the spirit and the power of the Priesthood are no longer needed, God has not changed the plan of salvation since the time of the ancient Apostles.

President Roberts referred to the attempt made by men who had sworn to support the Constitution, to trample upon the safe guards provided by it, in order to deprive the Latter-day Saints of their rights as citizens; and was thankful that their evil designs had been overruled. He discoursed upon the second coming of the Son of Man.

Elder Joseph said if we gain what is promised the righteous it will be by obedience to the laws and ordinances. If we reject these we will be condemned. Persecution has always been the heritage of the servants of God.

2 p.m. Elder Griffin urged the Saints to be prayerful, obedient and diligent in keeping the commandments of God, who is unchangeable.

Elder Holbrook bore testimony to the truth of the Gospel, and that it would stand whether men aided or opposed it.

Elder Miller spoke of the power displayed by the Lord in leading his people from Egypt and of the predictions of the prophets; that greater power would be manifested in the gathering of scattered Israel in the last days.

May 5th, 10 a.m. Elder Eldredge spoke of the plan of salvation; the necessity of those who administer in any of the ordinances of the Gospel being duly authorized.

President Roberts spoke of the Gospel as the perfect law of liberty, aiming to set man free from the bondage of sin. Read from the book of Doctrine and Covenants to show that the authority of the Priesthood is only to be exercised in righteousness and by persuasion.

2 p.m. The general authorities of the Church, the Presidency of the Southern States mission and the President, Elders and clerk of the Conference were sustained. F. P. Simmons was sustained as a teacher to preside over the branch of the Church at Baird's Mills.

Prest. Kelch spoke of the attributes of God showing that He is a personal being who created man in His own image.

Elder Godfrey said the Elders do not come from their homes to preach for hire. People will do well to give heed to the warnings of the servants of God lest they should repent too late as doubtless did the people in the days of Noah.

Prest. Jackson spoke on the first principles of the Gospel, and quoted the predictions of Paul concerning the false doctrines that were to be taught in the last days.

May 6, 10 a.m. Elder Hunter said God is extending the hand of mercy to mankind and sending His servants to teach them the truth. We must purify ourselves, and strive for perfection as God has commanded.

Elder Joseph said the laws of God are eternal, and the same ordinances are required for admission into His kingdom now as in ancient times, and the same works must be observed.

Wm Barrett was sustained as superintendent of the Sunday school at Baird's Mills.

Prest. Roberts spoke of the importance of teaching the children. No one can be saved in ignorance; showed that mankind has apostatized from the doctrines taught by the Savior and that God has again established His church in the last days.

2 p.m. Prest. Roberts said doubtless many of the reformers were wise men, and that God had accomplished certain purposes through their wisdom, but they had not been able to establish a church even resembling that left by Christ upon the earth. Joseph Smith, an unlearned youth, was blessed by divine manifestation, and was the instrument in the hands of God in establishing the kingdom foretold by Daniel. Man may rise against this kingdom and all the nations of the earth may oppose it with all the powers of darkness to aid them, but

unless they have power to dethrone the God of heaven, they can never stop its progress.

Priesthood meetings were held by the Elders each morning of the conference for prayer, and for counsel and instruction in regard to the missionary labors of the conference. The Saints here are feeling well and a good spirit prevailed at the meetings.

SANPETE STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of the Sanpete Stake convened in the New Tabernacle in Manti City, May 19th, 1883.

Exercises commenced by singing and prayer.

After which addresses were delivered by Elder George Reynolds and President John Taylor, followed by Elder A. H. Lund reading report of statistics and Sunday Schools.

President Taylor again addressed the conference, upon the duties and responsibilities of the officers and members of the Church. Adjourned to 2 p.m.

2 p.m. After the opening exercises the financial report of the Manti Temple was read by Counselor Maiben.

President Cannon was the first speaker. He dwelt upon the prosperity of the Latter-day Saints, some of the effects produced by the revelation and preaching of the Gospel; reviewed the course of some of those who were with the Prophet Joseph and afterwards fell away, and showed the necessity of observing the counsels of the holy Priesthood.

President Woodruff reviewed some of the sayings of the Prophet Joseph and their fulfillment; the requirement made of the Elders to visit notable cities with the proclamation of the Gospel, and denunciation that await those who reject it. Exhorted all, both old and young, to read and commit to memory the revelations of God, in order to become more thoroughly acquainted with the purposes of God and His work among the nations, and with the house of Israel.

President Peterson said the Apostles and Elders accompanying them, had preached to the Saints in many of the settlements of the north part of the Stake, on their way to Conference, announced that Conference would adjourn to 10 a.m. Sunday. Singing and benediction.

Sunday, 10 a.m. After singing and prayer, Apostle Moses Thatcher addressed the Conference upon the evils of indulging in intoxicating drink, advocated, where practicable, to prohibit the sale of intoxicants, and that where the Latter-day Saints are so largely in the majority this is practically in their own hands. Gave interesting statistics of the traffic in liquor in the United States and Great Britain; exhorted the Saints to purity of life.

Elders John Morgan and W. B. Preston followed in short addresses exhorting the Saints to faithfulness and the necessity of avoiding the use of strong drink and tobacco, as these habits unfit men for the duties and callings of the Holy Priesthood. Adjourned to 2 p.m.

2 p.m. After singing and prayer, Sacrament was administered. The General Stake and local Authorities were presented and all sustained unanimously.

President Geo. Q. Cannon, addressed the conference followed by President Taylor, each reviewing the many blessings and instructions enjoyed by the Saints, and the imperative duty resting upon the Elders to carry the Gospel to the nations that all people may have the privilege of hearing it in their own tongue, and also of seeking to know the will of God and then to do it which if they do no power will prevail against them.

President Taylor reviewed the order of the Priesthood, its duties and operations, authorities and power, and rights among the Saints, and spoke of the duty of all to use their influence and powers for the establishing of the principles of righteousness and the Kingdom of God on the earth.

Counselor Maiben gave notice of a general meeting for the young at 7:30 p.m., which Apostle Thatcher and Elder John Morgan were appointed to attend. Also of the following meetings: Pettyville 10 a.m., Mayfield 2 p.m., Gunnison 7:30 p.

m., Monday, Fayette 10 a.m., Levan 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

At 7:30 this p.m., President Taylor and Cannon held meeting in Ephraim.

Apostle Woodruff and Elder W. B. Preston went on to Moroni to fill an appointment for meeting there. Supt. Maiben gave notice of Sabbath School Jubilee at Mt. Pleasant on June 18th, and Manti on July 12th.

Conference adjourned to meet at Mount Pleasant in August next.

There were present at Conference of the First Presidency, John Taylor and George Q. Cannon, of the Apostles, W. Woodruff and Moses Thatcher, Elders George Reynolds, George F. Gibbs, John Morgan, President Paxman, of Juab, Prest. Preston, of Cache Stake, Prest. Peterson and Counselors of this stake. The commodious tabernacle was filled during each meeting to its utmost capacity and several hundreds were on the outside unable to gain admittance. We were favored by the presence of the Nephi Brass band, which discoursed excellent music.

Thus has passed our Conference, it has truly been a time of refreshing, all present seemed to be imbued with the spirit of Union and good fellowship, and nothing occurred to mar the peace and enjoyment of the multitude of people assembled.

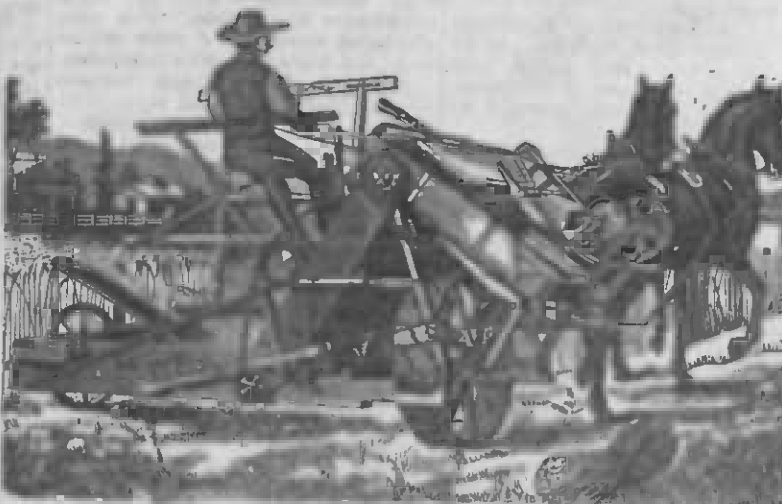
