UTAH COUNTY QUESTIONS.

Important Contests at American Fork.

From our regular correspondent we learn that American Fork City and the saloon men of that town are having a lively time. Several arrests have been made of late and fines imposed. It appears the city is getting the grip on in pretty good shape as some of the violators are pleading for mercy.

The lake resort near the village is causing quite a stir. The parties owning the stand have erected their building in the street (four rods in width), completely blocking up the road to the water. Parties desiring to visit the lake are prohibited without first paying twenty-five cents to parties owning land on either side of this lane. The populace are enraged at this, as they claim the right to use the street which the corporation has bought and holds deeds for. The city has notified the company using the road to move their buildings within ten days or suffer the consequences. The proprietors of the resort have been arrested for selling liquors without license from the city. A hearing was had a few days ago, but was postponed until yesterday. The defense put in a plea to the effect that the city had "no jurisdiction." (They have a county license.) The point to be decided will be who owns the ground, the government or the city? The "squatters" claim that since the survey the water has receded and they have the right to locate and carry on their traffic independent of the city. Some of the saloonkeepers have appealed their cases.

Utah County was visited with copious showers of rain on Sunday, much to the joy of the farmer.

Rock laying was begun on the City Hall at Pleasant Grove, Monday morning, July 11th.

John Dallin, of Springville, is erecting some bath houses and other accommodations for bathers at Battle Creek Station.

TO SCHOOL TRUSTEES.

INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING THE TAKING OF A SCHOOL CENSUS.

To the Public:

The Territorial school law provides that a census of all children in the Territory between the ages of 6 and 18 should be taken each year during the month of July. This is required for the purpose of enabling the Commissioner to make the proper apportionment of the school funds to the several counties and school districts, and is to be taken in each district by or under the direction of the trustees.

The Edmunds-Tucker law provides that in the collection of school statistics "the number of children of Mormon parents and the number of children of so-called Gentile parents" shall be ascertained, and with other information reported annually to Congress. For the purpose of complying with this provision of the act of Congress, I have prepared and distributed census blanks with appropriate columns for reporting the number of children of school age of the classes mentioned, respectively.

In the performance of their duties, I am informed the enumerators frequently have difficulty in procuring this information, it being assumed or considered by some as an unnecessary and impertinent inquiry.

With a proper understanding of the law, I cannot but assume every parent and guardian will cheerfully give the information required in this connection. I respectfully request all persons to aid the enumerators in the performance of their duties so that their reports may be accurate and complete.

The recent report of the poisoning of the waters of Dawho Lake, Georgetown County, South Carolina, by a hail storm proves to be true. A dense mass of black gum trees surround the lake on all sides. It is well known that the leaves of these trees are strongly impregnated with tannic acid. It has also been ascertained that the bottom of the lake contains a slight deposit of iron. The poisoning of the water, therefore, is thus explained: The hail storm filled the lake with bruised leaves and small branches from the trees. The tannic acid emanating from which mingled with the iron and formed tannate of iron, causing the water to turn black as ink and bitter as quinine and poisoning the fish by thousands. One species of the fish inhabiting this lake survived the singular disaster, and that was the mud fish, which buried itself in the mud at the bottom, and thus escaped the effects of the poison.
