Light Business Characterized the Transactions of the Early Calls.

MAY DAY STIFFENED AGAIN.

Stock Sold Up to 12 Cents—Demand For Little Chief—Closing Quotations and Sales.

After the vacation brought about through the observance of Washington's birthday, the members of the Salt Lake Stock & Mining exchange assembled at the usual hour this morning and the session was characterized by a dull market and slim sales. May Day stiffened slightly, however, and 1,500 shares went on the open board at 12 cents. New York Bonanza held its own, while Uncle Sam, to the extent of 100 shares, was brought out at 29 cents. Little Chief, however, was in demand, which was limited. Yankee Con. remained unchanged. On the open board some spirited bidding was indulged in for Ajax and 300 shares were brought out at 14 cents. CALUMETS AND HECLA.

Big Michigan Company Posts Dividends Aggregating \$1,800,000.

A bulletin was received over the private wire of James A. Pollock & Co. brokers, during the day announcing that the directors of the Calumet & Hecla mine of Michigan had declared a regular quarterly dividend of \$10 a share and also an extra of \$5 a share, making a grand total of \$15,000,000. The stock was quoted at \$60 a share during the day.

MINES AT ROOSEVELT.

Dewey Mine Said to be in Fine Condition—Roads Open.

Superintendent Ben Haug of the Dewey mine arrived yesterday from Roosevelt, says the mine is in fine condition. He made the trip in six days and declared it was the easiest journey of the kind he ever undertook. From Roosevelt to Johnson Creek he traveled by automobile, and the rest of the distance on sleighs. Mr. Haug is going to Pittsburgh with Mr. Dewey this week. He expects to return in about two weeks and will leave at once for the mine. He will probably go in on horseback as he believes this would be the most satisfactory way.

Mr. Haug said the Dewey was never in better condition. The mill was strictly on its good behavior. One of the mortars had been giving him a little trouble and it was necessary to take it out. The defect was remedied and everything was running smoothly when he left.

Mr. Haug reported that William Cress, the intrepid freighter who took the grins for the Sunnyside tramway, was back at Knox and prepared to move in the rock crusher. The road was open and the Sunnyside people were shoveling in hay and grain in order that teams might be kept moving constantly.

Roosevelt had a touch of the cold wave which swept over the state. The government thermometers at the Dewey registered 20 below zero and those at town sealed eight degrees lower. The snow was not very deep and the

The North Bingham Mining company of this city filed its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office today. Its capitalization is \$50,000, divided into shares of the par value of 10 cents each. J. E. Frick is president; F. Bonk, vice president; J. L. Bonk, treasurer; F. O. Frick, secretary.

Big Company Formed.

Butte, Mont., Feb. 22.—A Miner special from Helena says that articles of incorporation were filed with the state this afternoon of the King & Queen Mining company, capitalized at \$1,000,000, by a number of Pennsylvania mining men. The company's office will be at Pittsburgh. Well known mining property at Carbonate, Mont., will be extensively developed.

NOW UNDER STEAM.

Horn Silver Zinc Plant About Ready for Action.

W. H. Peck, manager of the zinc plant, recently completed at the Horn Silver mine, in Beaver county will go south tonight and expects to remain on the ground until the new mill is in operation. The recent cold snap, which enveloped the whole state, caused some delay in the starting, but now that all the obstacles are out of the way there is nothing to prevent the initial run being made within the next few days.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

Manager Giff of Oasie Mine Meets With Distressing Accident.

A cavein occurred in a mine at Oasie several days ago and as a result of the same Jedediah Giff, of this city, manager of the mine, is now in the latter-day hospital, suffering from a seriously injured knee. Mr. Giff and two workmen were down in the mine on an inspection when the accident happened. Some of the rock broke loose, Mr. Giff's head, which had been struck he would probably have been killed. As it was his knee which was seriously injured, and one of the miners was struck on the ankle by some rock which had fallen from the mine. Mr. Giff was carried out of the mine, and was sent on the first train to this city, where he will be confined in the hospital for some time.

THE TACOMA SMELTER.

Sale of Plant to the Trust is Practically Completed.

San Francisco, Feb. 22.—It is stated that the American Smelting & Refining company has at last gained control of the Tacoma smelter by purchase. Four million dollars is said to have been the price paid in this deal, which has been on the carpet for some months. D. O. Mills, who, with others, has been in charge of the Tacoma smelter for some time, said: "The final negotiations are now going on, and the deal will be over with soon, I think. New York parties are negotiating the sale of the smelter property, presumably for the American Smelting & Refining company. I do not desire to make any statement as to the price to be received for the Tacoma smelter, nor can I state authoritatively whether Mr. Rust will remain as general manager."
