Practically Ended - Will Complete Present Contracts, Then Demand Raise of Wages.

Land Slide at Riverdale Does Much Damage to Canal-Wedding -News Notes.

The strike which the early part of this week almost suspended building work in this city, has partially subsided and work on most of the buildings was resumed yesterday. The hodcarriers' union memebers who went out on the strike on account of the contractors refusing to raise their wages as demanded, have as yet been unable to come to any positive agreement, but have practically agreed to go back to work until the contracts are completed which have been begun, when it is un-derstood the hodcarriers will demand a raise of 25 cents per day in wages. Some of the union men stated last eve-ning that they are quite contented with the wares 25 for any united is the basis ning that they are dute contented with the wages, \$2.50 per day, which is be-ing paid at the present time, and that they expect to work this year at the present schedule of wages, providing the contractors will agree to raise their wages at least 25 cents per day from land 1.1944. They also stated that Jan. 1, 1904. They also stated that many of the union men were not desir-ous of quitting their work as they did, but complied with the request of the union officers.

DISASTROUS LANDSLIDE.

A large landslide occurred just east of A large landslide occurred just east of Riverdale on the hillside, causing con-siderable damage to the Weber and Da-vis county canal and the county road. The slide is nearly 100 feet long and several feet deep. The banks of the canal are torn out for nearly the full length of the slide, and the road is cov-ered over several feet deep with dirt. The canal company will be put to about \$1000 evenesses to repair the canal and \$1,000 expense to repair the canal and road. The slide was caused by the

weakness of the canal banks. The slide is almost in the same place as where the slide ocurred a short time ago, and the canal company may have to build flumes to make the canal secure.
