An Entire Freight Train Destroyed by Fire! CONGRESSIONAL. SENATE. Resolution relating to Internal Taxation. Sherman offered the following: The committee on finance is hereby instructed, during the recess of Congress, to carefully examine the existing system of taxation with a view to propose amendments to the House bill repealing certain taxes, now pending in the senate, as well as to simplify and reduce the internal taxes and duties on goods now in force, and in such manner that the aggregate of such taxes shall not exceed the sums required to defray the expenses of the government, so that taxes shall be distributed to impose the least burden upon the people. Sherman said the resolution represented the views of every member of the committee on finance. The income tax, he thought, was already covered by it. Sherman did not think there would be any objection to the resolution, but desired to have it laid over until tomorrow for consideration. It was accordingly laid over.
