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REMARKABLE ESCAPE.

A BOY FALLS DOWN A DEEP WELL, AND IS ONLY SLIGHTLY INJURED.

Yesterday morning Thos. Davis, 12 years old, son of Brother E. W. Davis, of the 17th Ward, was let down well on the family premises to get a little girl's hat that had fallen down the day previous. The well is thirty feet deep and has a depth of water of six feet. The lad got along all right till he reached the level of the surface of the ground after having procured the object of his solitude. As he was about to step out, the windlass gave way and down went the lad and it together, he being undermost. Plump he went into the water, and was struck on the head by the windlass. He immediately climbed out of his perilous position, and had already got half way up the well when the means of rescue reached him. The only injury he received was from the blow on his head from the windlass, but the hurt is not serious and he will be about in a day or so as sound as ever. His escape was astonishing.

A FEARFUL CALAMITY.

A WOMAN IN LUGAR HOUSE WARD FATALLY BURNED.

A terrible incident occurred in Sugar House Ward last night, on what was formerly President Young's farm, where he had a co-necery. Mrs. Anna Johanna Katrina Jensen, was at work with a sewing machine, when the accidentally overturned a lamp, which broke and the flaming fluid was spread all over the floor. The lady at once attempted to extinguish the fire with her clothing, and as a natural consequence was herself immediately enveloped in flames. The screams of the poor woman and her three small children, the only inmates of the room, alarmed persons occupying other portions of the building and they rushed to her rescue. Before they reached her she had gained the outside of the house, and a woman who was the first to get near dashed a quantity of water over her, and the flames were soon extinguished, but not until she had been horribly burned. Her hands and feet were reduced to a crisp, while the whole of her body was dreadfully scorched with the exception of the upper portion of the back, the face was only slightly marred, her head escaping injury entirely. The unfortunate woman received all the care and attention that could be given under the circumstances, but her injuries were necessarily fatal, and after intense suffering she expired from their effects at 9 o'clock this morning.

The deceased was 29 years old, and came to this country from Denmark five years ago. She was a faithful Latter-day Saint, and esteemed for many estimable qualities. Her family are thrown into the deepest grief by the terrible occurrence. The Scandinavian Star and Ogden papers are requested to make a note of the sad affair.

She bore her affliction with becoming fortitude, being tenacious of life to the last and only yielded when nature was fully exhausted. OBITUARY.

KERCH.—As her residence in this city, Sep. 10th, of dropsy, Sister Elizabeth Kerch, the beloved wife of Elder Joseph W. Johnson.

She was born July 24, 1817. Buried by Pastor Hymen Smith, Nov. 1st, 1883, into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, at Colville, Brown County, New York, she being the youngest member of the Church at that time.

She was the daughter of Joseph and Polly Kerch, and went up in the first company to Jackson County, Missouri, in 1831, her brother, Newell Kerch, residing there in all the persecutions and drivings of Missouri and with her father's family went to Nauvoo in 1839, was married to Brother Joseph W. Johnson in 1845, endured the hardships and persecutions in that place and left with her husband for the West, February, 1846, crossing the Mississippi on the ice, remaining at Mount Pisgah until the spring of 1846; crossed the plains in the first company, led by Apostle Lorenzo Snow, arriving in Salt Lake City, September 10th, 1846; she resided in the Fourteenth Ward where she has been highly respected as a faithful, humble, industrious worker in the cause of righteousness.

She was a useful member of the Relief Society, and a devoted mother. The following is the principle of the Gospel as revealed through the Prophet Joseph Smith, a true Latter-day Saint. During her sickness she was often relieved and blessed under the administration of the Elders, but she did not get better; was willing to go the other side the veil, and meet her friends who had gone before to the home of the Saints on high.
