Kansas City, Stockyards, Oct. 22.-There is a big reduction in cattle re-ceipts today as compared with recent Mendays, If.600 head here today. The market ruled steady all of last week, and is steady to strong today. Grass steers from Kansas and Oklahoma pas-tures are setting pretty well run out, re-sulting in a shortage and packers are pay-ing 25 to 40 cents more for them now than two weeks ago. This condition is encouraging to Colorado and other west. ern shippers, form which country 75 pr cent of the stuff still remains to be moy-ed. Country buyers are taking hold freely, and prices on that class remain firm. Yery few cattle from the range are here to-day, and not many are expected this week, and the market shruld, be goed balance of the week. Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and western Texas, all had lots of cattle from List week, stockers selling from 3.00 to 3.75, feeders 3.30 to 4.90, Colo-rado and Utah Killing steers sold at 3.65 to 4.30, cows 2.70 to 3.35, heifers up to 3.75, bulls 2.15 to 2.90. New Mexico and panhandle cows sell at 2.40 to 3.00, canners and wet cows, 1.85 to 2.25. The sheep run was liberal last week, 45,00 head, market 15 to 25 cents higher, lambs selling at 7.15 to 7.60, Since Thurs-day there has been a reaction in the market so to bigh as compared with eastern points. Run 18,900 today, lambs selling at 6.90 to 7.25, yearlings 5.25 to 5.75, wethers 5.00 to 5.5, even 4.75 to 5.40. A large share of the supply runs to feeding stock, which finds ready sale, lambs at 5.80 to 6.15, whiles and breeding ewes, 4.30 to 5.5, The end of the range season is in sight, and supplies are likely to be short for awhile.
