

DANCE HOUSE REVIVALS.

The New York correspondent of the San Francisco Call writes the following picture of the revivals that are going on in Water street, New York:

The water street revival meetings, among the sailors and the abandoned women, are becoming more and more extraordinary things, and as scandalous humbugs are attracting more and more of the public. I am sorry to say, to the credit of religion. In truth they are bringing true religion into popular contempt. They are making it the subject of profane jests and laughable mimeries. They are robbing it of all solemnity, and degrading it in men's mouths, and to a subject of farcical commentary. It has leaked out that John Allen, who has actually closed his dance-house, has been paid \$500 in advance for its use for devotional purposes one hour in each day, and gets splendidly drunk on the money. He started out last Saturday to deliver religious lectures, in Connecticut on the faith of his conversion as "the wickedest man in New-York," but nobody had confidence in his conversion, and after getting half a dozen persons into a room at Stamford, he had to return their money and abandon the exhibition. They say that Mr. Barnum had the lecture written for him, and in this case the exhibition was an offer, which he accepted to travel, but that when he succeeded in procuring from Barnum a suitable lecture, he ignored Barnum altogether, and concluded to travel and speculate upon "his own hook." Rumor has it, however, that he keeps, half the time, pretty tipsy and unfit for public speaking; though, as he was originally a Universalist minister, (as Mr. Barnum, himself, was originally,) public speaking is not to him, so arduous an undertaking. At Bridgeport, Conn., last Monday, they refused to listen to him, and placed him down when he commenced to "address the public on the subject of religion."

But the great point of attraction, just now, is the rat-pit of "Kit" Burns. Kit is not a woman, despite the name familiarly bestowed upon him, but is notorious as the keeper of a variety of fighting dogs, which he exhibits, every now and then, in sanguinary encounters in a large "pit" he has erected in his house for the purpose. In this same pit he gives regular exhibitions of rapid rat-killing with his favorite terriers. This rat-pit has been hired by the Reverend revivalists at \$250 a week, cash in advance, for one hour's religious services a day, say from noon until 1 p.m. During this hour Kit is engaged to close his bar and affect a pious air, being at liberty, when the hour has expired, to go on with his business. In Kit's rat-pit gathers, every day, therefore, a motley crowd. The respectable portion go to see the place itself, or to witness what is going on. The "roughs" go there to be amused, the thieves to privately rob each congregation, and the sincerely religious to aid in converting the horrible women and worse men of that abominable neighborhood. This is a gentlemanly blackguard when dressed up on these occasions; is dressed up very nicely—wears a very handsome diamond breast-pin, and keeps himself as clean as a new pin. He cannot always turn a deaf ear, though, to the appeals of his old friends for a drink, even during the hour when his bar should be closed. For instance, here is a scene depicted by a reporter:

Thirsty individual—"Come, Kit, I'm it, we have been waiting for you. Let's have a drink!"

Burns—(for it was he.)—"No, my lad, it can't be did. My brothers are at prayers upstairs, and I'll be d-d if I sell any liquor. You can have soda or sarsaparilla if you like."

At this moment a clerical looking gentleman entered and looking anxiously around; Kit again emerged from the mysterious room and was addressed by the new comer.

Kit—"No, sir; I am not."

Clerical gent—"Can I see him?"

Kit—"Yes, sir; he is in there relating his experience. He is on the floor at this minute."

Clerical gent—"Blessed be God, I must go and hear him." Clerical gent makes for the private door; Kit gets in before him and slams the door in his face. Clerical gent is shown to the rat pit, where the reporter mounts also, just as the following verse was being sung:

"Jesus paid it all, all to him I owe,"
