Constrantinopies, 15, - Several batteries of artillery and 18 batta-lions have been sent to Volo as a precaution against a possible dis-turbance. The Rhodops insurgents have exhausted their ammunition and suffer from scarcity of provi-sions. Differences have broken out among the chiefs, some wishing to accept amnesty.
