House Judiciary Committee Passes. Resolutions Asking Attorney General for It.

# ONE RELATES TO MERCER CASE.

Have Criminal Proceedings Been Instituted Against Those Declared Guilty by Supreme Court?

Washington, April 20 .- At a meeting today of the house judiciary committee, Mr. Williams of Mississippl, the minority leader, charged that the attorney-general had failed in his duty to conduct criminal prosecutions against those declared by the supreme court in the merger cases to have violated the anti-trust law, and also had failed to institute legal proceedings against the anthracite coal carrying roads, although the attorney-general had in his possession a report favorable to prosecutions. In a letter to the chairman of the committee, which was read, the attorney-general declared it would be incompatible with public interest to give the information to Congress, but Mr. Williams declared that it was the duty of Congress to impeach an officer of the government chronically failing to observe his oath in the execution of the law

Through the failure of all but three of the Republican members to attend the meeting of the committee on judi-ciary today favarable reports were au-thorized on the second seco thorized on two resolutions introduced by Mr. Williams, the minority floor leader, calling for information from the attorney-general. Chairman Jenkins endeavored to prevent action on the resolutions, but a vote was forced. The six Democratic members of the com-mittee were present and the chairman voted with them. One of the resoluvoted with them. One of the resolu-tions favorably acted upon requests the atterney-general to inform the house whether an investigation was ever had and report made "of the socalled anthracite coal trust, consisting of the anthracite carrying railroads doing an interstate business," and if so to send the full report of such in-vestigation to the house.

The other resolution requests the at-torney-general to informa the house whether any criminal prosecutions have been instituted against individu-als or corporations who were adjudged recently by the supreme court of the United States in the Northern Securi-ties case to be guilty of having violated the laws of the United States by en-tering into unlawful combinations in restraint of interstate commerce and if so to send to the house all papers, etc., in such cases.

# War May End Soon.

Washington, April 20.-The an-nouncement from St. Petersburg by the Associated Press of the withdrawal of Alexieff from the far east together with the lucid and interesting story of the rise and fall of the radical ele-ment in Russia headed by Alexieff and Bezobzrazoff was received with inter-est in official circles here. The change just indicated is believed to portend n complete reversal of Russian policy in Manchuria and it is thought that could Russia save her face and pride before the civilized world by scoring a decisive victory on land the way would speedily be opened for peace negotiations on the board basis of the last Japanese proposition just before the cutbreak of the war. The restoration to power and influence of M. Witte, the deposed Russian minister of finance, who so strongly opposed war, is expected to follow very soon.

### Shot on a Freight Train.

Helena, Mont., April 21 .- Michael Ries of Columbus, Mont., was killed on a Northern Pacific freight train near Bozeman early this moraing, and the man who is supposed to have done man who is supposed to have done the shooting escaped from the train and is now being hunted by the sheriff. The murder was evidently for the pur-pose of robbery. Ries was en route to Bozeman and was accosted by a stranger who attempted to rob him. A scuffle ensued, the stranger later shooting Ries. He then jumped from the train and is still at large.

# When Perry Tuttle Heard Sentence He Fell in a Faint.

Akron, Colo., April 20.-Judge Armour today overruled the motions for a new trial in the Joseph Meenan murder case as to the defendants, Perry Tuttle and

Elmer Shanks, and sentenced them to Imprisonment for life at hard labor. He granted the defendant, George I. Tuttle, a new trial. Stay of 60 days was grant-ed as to the two men, to enable them to apply to the supreme court for a supersedeas and 90 days allowed them to prepare a bill of exceptions.

When Judge Armour announced his decision Perry Tuttle fell prostrate on the floor in a dead faint and the services of a physician were necessary to revive him.

The murder of Meenan was the outcome of a range fued which had much of the aspect of the famous Dewey case in western Kansas. The Tuttles are members of one of the wealthiest cat-tle raising families in this section. Joseph Meenan was a small ranchman.

The Tib-ctans were supposed to avoid literal infraction of the commandment by allow ing victims to starve to death, but this discovery points to regular executions in Gyang Tse.

THE TORONTO FIRE. Estimated That the Loss Will

Reach Twelve Millions.

Toronto, Ont., April 20 .- The total loss by the fire which destroyed the wholesale district of Toronto last night will, according to the most conservative estimate, reach \$12,000,000; the total insurance is \$8,360,000.
