BLOODLESS SHOOTING AFFRAY.

A DESPERADO EXCHANGES SHOTS WITH OFFICERS IN THE SIXTEENTH WARD.

Last night there came very near being a tragedy in the vicinity of the Sixteenth Ward school house. A well known professional horse-thief named Andrew Pettit was in that vicinity between seven and eight o'clock, his horse being tied up a short distance away. He was approached by a man, supposed to be a deputy U. S. Marshal, who accosted him. In a moment Pettit drew a revolver, pointed it at the other individual and backed toward his horse. The man who intended to arrest Pettit was of course helpless under the circumstances, the thief having the drop on him. Reaching his horse the desperado leaped into the saddle and as he was riding off the other man pulled his pistol and several shots were exchanged, but so far as known, without effect.

The affair occurred in front of a house, and a young girl stood near where the scene was enacted and witnessed the whole of it. The congregation assembled at evening service in the adjacent school-house, heard the shots, but did not know what was transpiring. Pettit's hat, (a soft brown felt,) was picked up from the street afterwards and is now at the City Hall. There is a bullet hole through the rim, a little to the right of the back and close to the head, showing that the wearer had a close call.

We understand that the man who attempted Pettit's arrest was a U. S. officer, but we are not positive on that point, as up to one o'clock to-day the particulars had not been reported to Marshal Ireland. The officers have been after the desperado for some time, however, on account of some new horse-stealing operations. He is a desperate character, and the officers will be unwise if they take many chances in attempting his capture. His reputation is that he will shoot without hesitation when his liberty is at stake.

Since the above was written we have seen a gentleman who resides in the vicinity of the place where the shooting occurred. His statement corroborates the foregoing with the exception that instead of one man approaching Pettit there were three, two of whom were U. S. officers and the other was Gleason Rolph, from whom Pettit had stolen some horses. Six or seven shots were fired, and the people in the neighborhood were considerably excited. One lady, Mrs. Stevenson, who was sitting by the bed-side of her sick daughter, fainted on hearing the sound of the pistol reports.
