## WANT INTERURBAN IN CANYON.

At the meeting of the board of county commissioners held yesterday afternoon, a delegation from Huntsville and other Ogden valley towns, appeared in behalf of the franchise for the construction of an electric road through Ogden canyon. A lengthy petition, signed by nearly all the residents in Ogden valley, was also filed with the county board, asking the granting of the petition for a franchise.

Last Wednesday a meeting was held at the Hotel Ogden, at which the Ogden Rapid Transit company, at which the franchise in all its phases was discussed and explained to the taxpayers and residents of the valley. The benefits to the people of the valley were pointed out as well as the fact that the building of the line would increase the value of property in that district.

The communication to the commission was signed by Jesse Knight and other heavy taxpayers of Huntsville, Eden and Liberty. The petition was taken under advisement.

## WEBER ACADEMY BAND.

Prof. E. W. Nichols of the Weber academy has placed orders for eight new uniforms for the academy band, which now numbers 26 players. The reports the organization as doing splendid work and on one or two occasions this fall has been paraded about the city and have added credit to themselves and the school.

Prof. Nichols, who also has charge of the music at the State Industrial school, has organized a band of 16 pieces and reports excellent progress there.

The deceased was born in England 77 years ago, and came to Utah when she was a little girl. She is survived by four children, 13 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. The funeral arrangements will be made later.

Porter Fined—Brown R. James, a negro porter, was given a 30-day sentence this forenoon for obtaining money under false pretense.

Election Returns—The Weber county commissioners this morning completed the canvass of the election returns, and will issue a statement this afternoon. There are but few changes from the returns already published.

New Pastor Arrives—Rev. W. W. Fleetwood, the new pastor for the Episcopal church, has arrived in the city from Chicago. He delivered his first sermon Sunday at the church and has already won scores of friends. He succeeds Rev. Alfred Brown, who was rector of the church for five years but had to resign on account of poor health.

Forrester Busy—Monday was a busy day for District Forrester Clyde Leavitt. He arrived in Ogden to take charge of the Ogden office of the forest service. The entire fifth floor of the First National bank is to be used for offices and it was there that Mr. Leavitt spent a great amount of his time in supervising their fitting up. Asst. Engineer A. T. Michelson will have charge of the engineering projects and work in the county, and A. M. Smith will have charge of the supply department of the district, just as they have had since the offices were established in the city.

Arrested for Horse-stealing—William Hamilton was arrested yesterday afternoon by Detective James Pender and will be held pending an investigation concerning the stealing of a horse from the premises of the Amalgamated Sugar company in West Weber. The horse, which belongs to A. Chandler and was kept at the factory, was stolen Sunday evening and was recovered by Detective Hutchings yesterday. In default of \$500 bonds Hamilton was remanded to the custody of the sheriff to await a hearing.

## PROVO.

### DEPOT FRANCHISE GRANTED.

To R. G. W. on Sixth South Street—Other Council Notes.

#### Special Correspondence.

Provo, Nov. 10.—The franchise granting a right of way and depot on a portion of Sixth South street to the Denver & Rio Grande railroad for the erection of a union depot was passed by last night, by the city council. The proposed passenger depot is to cost not less than \$15,000. Work is to be commenced within a year from date of accepting the franchise and to be completed within two years.

The vote was 6 to 2, Councilman Van Wagenen being absent. Those voting against the bill were Councilmen Giles, Thomas and Newell. Mayor Decker will sign the bill. Whether any further steps will be taken by Mr. Knight in opposition to the depot is uncertain, but the general opinion is that such will not be the case.

This is the franchise asked for by the railroad company last spring and action on which has been deferred pending the ruling of Judge T. D. Lewis on an injunction obtained by Jesse Knight. The ruling of Judge Lewis, sustaining the demurrer to the injunction, left no obstructions in the way of passing the ordinance granting the franchise. The committee on fire department recommended that the chief of fire department be authorized to purchase 500 feet of hose. Report adopted.

Spring City, Santepe Co., Nov. 7.—Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Stewart and Winters amputated the left leg of Preston Hansen, the nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hansen of Spring City. The operation was performed at Mr. Hansen's home, and was successful.

The other day as Mr. Hansen was driving from his farm in a small buggy, the boy, Preston, was sitting behind on some sacks of potatoes. His feet were hanging over the back end of the buggy and by the motion of the vehicle one of them was thrown into the wheel and caught between it and the spokes. Before the horses could be stopped the boy's leg had been twisted around the axle of the buggy, breaking the bones and tearing and cutting the flesh. The boy was hurried home and made him as comfortable as possible. The doctor did his best to save the limb, but gangrene set in, and amputation became necessary. Routine Business Only Transacted by City Fathers Last Night.

## OGDEN CITY SCHOOL AFFAIRS

### Ogden Valley People Want Interurban Road Through Canyon—Death Of Mrs. Howell.

Ogden, Nov. 10.—Chief of Police Browning submitted the resignation of Fred M. Tout as patrolman. Upon motion the resignation was referred to the police committee, all members of the council voting for the same except President Browning.

Claims amounting to \$3,130.89 for all departments of the city were allowed and ordered paid, as was also the claim of \$25.50 to the firm of Smith & Hodgson for plans for the Central heating plant, which is to be erected on the city hall square.

The ordinances creating sidewalk district number 3 extending, embracing Twenty-sixth street between Jackson and Healy avenues; district No. 21 extension 3, Van Buren avenue between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-sixth streets and district No. 13 extension 2, and levying a special tax on the abutting property, passed their second reading by a suspension of the rules. The ordinances were referred to the law committee.

Councilman Dana was granted a two weeks' leave of absence.

## OGDEN SCHOOL AFFAIRS.

### Bids for High School Building Will be Advertised for at Once.

Ogden, Nov. 10.—Everything is now in readiness for bids on the new high school building which must be completed according to the contract by the first of next August. At a meeting of the board of education last evening the plans of Smith & Hodgson originally submitted were adopted with minor changes suggested by members of the board. Bids will be advertised for immediately and must be completed by the first of next month. The contract will then be let to the lowest bidder and ground for the new building broken at once, with appropriate exercises.

Upon the suggestions of the state board of health teachers will hereafter be required to examine and report to parents all cases of defective hearing, eyesight and abnormal growth found among the pupils. The parents will be required to have medical examination made of their children and to prevent them from being handicapped by their affliction.

The health condition in the city schools is now better than for some time. Out of an attendance of 5,000 pupils, the health committee reports only three cases of contagion now existing.

## ANNUAL CHINA SHOW.

Mrs. J. L. Herriek has announced her annual exhibit of hand painted china on Wednesday and Thursday of this week at her home 2750 Washington avenue. This is the last exhibition Mrs. Herriek will give in Ogden for a number of years as she will leave in about a month for Denver, Colorado, where she accompanies Mr. Herriek who has been appointed president of the Western States Mission.
