## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Farrell to Sing—A. L. Farrell will sing in concert at Murray Monday evening next.

Reynolds Appointed—R. V. Reynolds has been named and forest technical assistant of the Utah forest, with headquarters at Provo. He begins active work July 1.

Fremont to Meet—There will be a special meeting of the Veterans Volunteer Fremont at the hall, 271 Canyon road, June 14, at 4 o'clock p. m. All Veterans are invited.

Passes Hundred Thousands—The population of Salt Lake as estimated by the city directory now approaching completion is 111,122. The directory will be ready for publication the first of the month.

Thieves Seal Specimens—Several pieces of valuable ore and a few miscellaneous articles were stolen from the Chamber of Commerce the other evening during the holding of the no license law meeting. The police are in hot pursuit.

Twelve New Homes—Fred Kuster has bought four lots on Fifth East street, between Third and Fourth East streets, from the Maxwell estate for \$5,000. Mr. Kuster expects to erect 12 dwellings of the ground, involving an outlay of \$15,000.

Rent Lease Sold—Dr. L. J. Dull, of the Union Dental company, has purchased the lease on the Romney block, at 212 south second, for the price of \$15,000. Dr. Dull will make an entire improvement in the premises which the architect estimates will cost \$50,000.

On Practice March—Companies F, G, and H of the Fifteenth infantry are encamped in Parley's canyon on a practice march, and the third battalion of the regiment will practice marching in the canyon, the hike taking six days. Camp will be pitched at Lagoon for flag day.

Operation for Gravel—Mr. O. A. Andelin, an old resident of Richfield, died at the L. D. S. hospital, where he recently underwent an operation for gravel. He has been suffering for a long time, but under the operation a large stone was removed, and he is now progressing favorably toward recovery.

Files Claim Against City—Edda Houtz has filed a claim with the city recorder in which she asks for \$5,000 damages for injuries which it is alleged she received by being thrown from a buggy in front of the city hall at Fifth East and Fifth South streets. She claims that her eyesight has been permanently injured, and that she was seriously injured in the back, arms and spine by the accident.

Killed by Falling Rock—Pete Cesera, a miner employed by the Highland Boy Mining company, was killed by a falling rock yesterday morning at Blinham. He was cleaning out an old tunnel when a large boulder fell upon him, crushing him to death. The funeral will be conducted at the Catholic church Sunday afternoon. Cesera was 32 years of age and had no family or relatives residing here.

## MERCHANT ENDS LIFE

William F. Callaway Grows Despondent Because of Failing Health and Takes Poison with Fatal Effect.

William F. Callaway, of the firm of Callaway, Hook & Francis, one of the best known business men of the west, committed suicide in his room at the Sanitarium yesterday afternoon by taking cyanide. His self-destruction was the result of a lingering attack of melancholia brought on by ill health. His suicide was a great shock to his many friends here, as he was highly respected by all who knew him.

In the hope of regaining his health Mr. Callaway took a trip some time ago to California, returning about six weeks ago. Upon his return it was believed his health was greatly improved, but he became ill again and for some time under treatment at St. Mark's hospital.

Yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock he came down town and called on his business associates. He did not then appear to be discouraged and talked cheerfully enough to his companions. Leaving the store he went to his room and at 4:30 his lifeless body was found by his claim Taylor. The remains were in the room was an envelope containing poison. Mr. Callaway left a number of sealed letters to his daughter.

Mr. Callaway was born at Seaford, Del., 45 years ago. When a young man he came west, locating in Colorado, where he engaged in the crockery business. After leaving Denver and Leadville, he came to Salt Lake when the firm of Callaway, Hook & Francis was formed.

Born his daughter, Mr. Callaway leaves two brothers, John Callaway of Leadville, and Fred Callaway of Seaford, Del. Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made.

## FUNERAL OF MRS. HALWAY.

The funeral of Mrs. Eliza Halway took place yesterday in the chapel of Joseph Williams Taylor. The remains were interred in the city cemetery. Mrs. Halway was 70 years of age, and died Wednesday at the county infirmary, from injuries received by falling from one of the upper windows of that institution.

The circumstances surrounding the accident are variously related. Steward A. F. Kendall states that of late Mrs. Halway had been suffering from nervous prostration and was placed in a specially protected room on the third floor. He believed she found the door unlocked and walked to the third landing and jumped or fell from the window. Other persons state that Mrs. Halway fell from the window of the room in which she had been placed, the heavy screens usually employed not being in place.
