AQUATIC MEETS ARE HERE TO STAY

Swimming Contests at Wandamere Develop Into Most Interesting Competitions.

Utah amateur aquatic meets have come to stay.

After the splendid swimming contests Saturday afternoon, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., at Wandamere, nothing short of absolute indifference will prevent an annual recurrence of the events, and each should prove better than the last.

There was a large and enthusiastic crowd on hand and some rare sport was witnessed. Every contest was keen and records were smashed. The association swimmers had to meet foemen worthy of their steel in the Sanitarium swimmers and the two institutions fought it out gamely.

Undoubtedly the most interesting event of the day was the half-mile race between A. Adamson of the Y. M. C. A. and Howard of the Sanitarium. Up to within a very short distance of the finish they swam neck and neck and then the association swimmers forged ahead and won by a narrow margin.

A feature was the under water swim of Stark, who went 100 feet in 1:15. The thing to be desired for future meets is more competition, and if this is established there will be no more amateur sport of greater popularity in the state. A summary of the events follows:

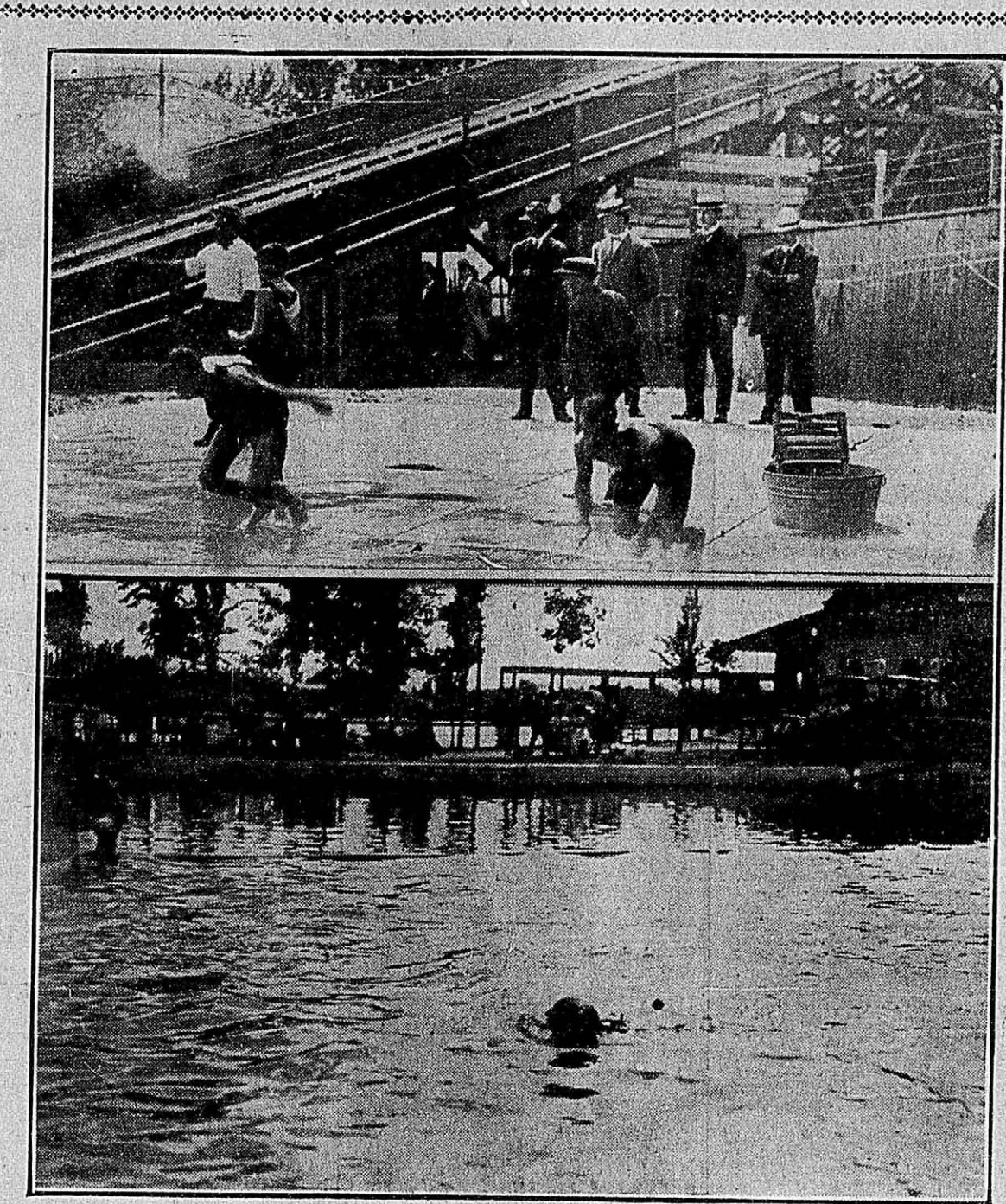

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MILE TRACK IS NOW ASSURED

Famous Old Course to be Revived and May Develop Into a Big Thing in Racing Line.

The old Buena Vista race track, built many years ago by Utahians who love the "sport of kings," located a couple of blocks west of the Popular Grove car line, is to be rebuilt, and if the plans of those who have the matter in charge are carried, it is quite sure to become a noted speed course not only for equines but automobiles as well.

The Utah Jockey club has secured a lease on the old plant and also secured permission from the Pacific Jockey club, with full protection, for a 30-day running race meeting to start in September. Manager W. W. Finn, as soon as the track was secured, started men to work on the course, and the result is a big change in the appearance of that part of the country from what it was a short time ago. The sagebrush which covered the track has been cleared away, carpenters are busily engaged in building fences, stalls, paddocks, stands, etc., and men are at work completing a water system from flowing wells. The track is a full mile, 70 feet wide with an 80-foot stretch. It would be ideal for automobile races as well as horse races.

The place can be easily reached by three modes of transportation. It is only a short distance from the street car line, within about 20 feet of the Salt Lake Route tracks and can be easily reached by automobile or carriage. Arrangements have been made with the railway company to build a station there and trains will run to and from the course with such frequency as to accommodate the crowds.

The stalls, paddock, etc., will soon be completed and work on the grandstand is to be rushed. Manager Finn says the track will be ready for the events before the opening date rolls around. J. W. Rice has written from Butte to the effect that about 400 horses will come down from that city and will be housed at the new track. There will be no races there during the races at the state fair.

AMERICA MAY NOT GET JEFF-JOHNSON FIGHT

New York, Aug. 9.—America is by no means certain to see the proposed Jeff-Johnson prizefight for the heavy-weight championship of the world. It is stated here by a close personal friend of Jeffries that the boxer's trip to Europe is not so much to take the bats at Carlisle, but to negotiate with the National Sporting club of London and promoters of the holding of the fight in either place. Quiet representations have come from the National Sporting club to the effect that London would be willing to pay as much if not more for this fight than any other city in the world. Also several interests in Paris have indicated a desire to submit offers for holding the fight there, and it is to see exactly how much money London and Paris will offer for the fight that Jeffries has gone abroad, so it is intimated here.

Sam Berger, Jeffries' manager, says if he does not hear from Jack Johnson by the end of the week, he will go to California to consult with the fight clubs there and in Nevada as to possible purses that might be offered. According to Berger, much depends upon the outcome of Johnson's fight with Ketchel in California in October. In the meantime, Ketchel has an engagement here for 10 runs to Sam Langford on Sept. 3, which may change the outlook entirely.

The offers from Savannah and Denver for the big fight are not seriously considered, as neither Georgia nor Colorado will permit a finish fight.

SWIMMING HELL GATE.

New York, Aug. 9.—Five out of seven youths who attempted to swim the East river from Manhattan through the treacherous waters of Hell Gate to North Beach, a distance of five and one-half miles, were overcome and taken from the water. One of them had gone down twice when he was saved by a conveyance boat. A lad of 15 was drowning when he was saved.

The swimming of Hell Gate is a most dangerous feat. The tide runs at a tremendous rate and the uncertain current makes the final test of the swimmers' prowess. The winner made the distance in one hour and 27 minutes.

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
