THE IDAHO LEGISLATURE.

Wearisome Work of Re-acting Old Laws.

(CODE COMMISSION TALKED OF)

Important Court Decision—Even More Important—Complication—“Diamonds”—“Gold Jack” Butte case.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 15.—Up to the close of the legislative session evening, one hundred and fifty bills, representing the old laws, had passed both houses and become constitutional laws of this state. In all there are something like 250 bills that will have to be re-enacted in order to revise the laws of the state. It is an arduous task and the legislature is weary of the work. The bills are introduced for re-enactment by the judiciary committee in the form of separate bills, they are reported in bunches of twenty or thirty at a time. After one lot is in the hands of the judiciary committee, the committee will have to re-enact the bills in its place and re-pass the former motion for suspension of the rules and the necessary action of the constitution. This is done in each bill, and is followed by the calling of the roll, which consumes a great deal of time and gives up a record that makes the clerk's book. A time saving plan was suggested by Mr. McElroy of Keokuk. All these bills will have to be read in full, and re-passed by the legislature. The bills are given a bill, and told to read. COTE COMMISSION.

Probably the most important measure introduced thus far is that of Senator McElroy, known as the “Cote” bill. It provides for the appointment of a committee of five members by the governor, to codify the laws, and also providing for the publication of the laws in a digest.
