CARISA STILL IN DEMAND.

Ontario on Active List—May Day Weakened—Butler-Liberal Lower Closing Quotation and Sales.

More business was transacted on the floor of the Salt Lake Stock & Mining Exchange this forenoon than during any other day during the week and there was a slightly better tone to the market all around. There were no sharp advances noted, many stocks held their own. Weakness was displayed by some but in no case did it amount to much. Carisa seemed to be in very good demand and, in fact recorded the big sales of the day. May Day moved down few points as did Butler-Liberal, which assessment bytes yesterday having its effect. A small lot of Ontario found a taker at \$2.50 when New York fell of 2 cents a share during the call.

Bingham's Only Custom Mill Almost Ready for Business.

Col. A. E. Wall is in Bingham today, stamping up a new mill, the "old Jim Crow" mill, the old Dewey plant, which is being equipped with machinery of his own design, including

the Nonpareil Con.

New Company Formed to Operate in Box Elder County.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Nonpareil Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company of George Cross, regular county, is filed in the secretary of state's office of Idaho. Its capital stock is \$10,000, divided into shares of the face value of 10 cents each. Thomas Edwards is president, H. T. McEvily, treasurer. The company seems a little bit like a new name, but the old one is still there.

The officers of the company have issued a statement to that effect in which they advise that the plant will be moved to and operated on the acres of another mine.

Other than the fact that the plant is to be moved to another place, nothing further is known.

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Mr. McEvily, general manager of the Bingham Consolidated Mining Company, returned from the east last night after a visit to the general offices of the company in Denver. He says he has gathered information concerning the old workings, including those in the effect that the Bingham ton is likely to purchase the U.S. Gold Mine in Clifton Hill.

The U.S. Gold Mine is showing up well. Work is being pushed on the shaft which is now down 150 feet. An expert on the subject has been engaged. Mr. McEvily could not say just how pleased he is with the work done.

He said a six-inch mass of some of the ore would soon make him independent. This is encouraging to the owners as well as to the operators. Work is expected daily of the result of the meeting of the board of directors in the matter of erecting a smelter north of town. This

will take a recess.

The governing board of the mining exchange held this morning to take action from the close of next Saturday's call until Wednesday morning. This

is something that all are interested in and we anxiously await their decision.
