THE SIEGE OF STRASBOURG

Ulrich, of Strasbourg, is a name which is inkely to become famous, or infamous, in connection with the pres ent struggle between Proseis and France, Strasbourg, celebrated throughout the world, on account of its cathedrai and library, has been undergoing, for weeks past, all the horrors of a rigorous siege on the past of the Prussians. The besieged have held out manfally, but with no hope of success. Their re sistance has had a tendency to inflame the determination of the besiegers to reduce the place, and friumph on the part of the latter, is merely a question of time, and cannot be long deferred.

Brave resistance on the part of the carrison of a beleaguered city, and the endurance by the citizens of suffering and ruin, rather than capitulate, as long as any probability of successful resistance exists, always commands the respect and admiration of the world but when this is no longer probable the slaughter, fuin, and misery which are inevitably incurred by the continuance of such a struggle are deplored and condemned. Such seems to be the case now with Strasbourg. Its garrison has withstood the furious and oft-repeated onslaughts of determined assail auts with heroism the most unfaltering; its citizens have endured untold horrors; the city has resounded with the crics and death shricks of women and children; the shells of the besiegers have spread consternation and death even into the schools of the city; the garrison and people are enduring the horrors of hunger, and still the cry o the commandant is, "I will hold out to the last."

Seeing that nothing can be done more than has been done to prevent capitulation to the Prussians, and that the preservation of the city is hopeless, what possible good can result from prolonging the seige and the hunger, suffering and ruin of the citizens? The grand old cathedral has been seriously damaged; its library, one of the finest wrought through the entire city, is so land dog, which, however, died of scurgreat that, according to yesterday's dispatches, it is almost untenable. Surely the Vandalism of the beseigers has gone far enough, and universal public opinion will be satisfied with the heroic efforts which have been made to stay it. H commander Ulrich persists in his hopeless resistance, it is to be hoped that for Humanity's sake, the government whose employe he is, will issue the necessary orders to stay the nunecessary suffering and loss of human life and property which such a course will involve.
