In a communication to J. E. Doply on the matter of litah lake drying up, Prof. Swendsen says:

"Prior to 1903 only the Spanish Fork and Provo rivers were measured, and my estimate of their discharge for 1902 was 160,000 acre feet discharged into Jiah lake, including rainfall at the

lake surface. "During 1903 and 1904 all of the streams, numbering 26, were meas-ured. The aggregate flow from August, 1903, to August, 1904, was 471,140 acrs

feet, rainfall on the lake surface not included. By taking into account evaporation and outflow, together with lake fluctuations, we figure that a total of 604,010 acre feet must hve reached the lake, leaving 132,870 to be accounted for, and which we have referred to as uneasured supply, coming probably from

springs, seepage, etc. "This information is based upon an evaporation factor of five feet per yea and the same computation, if extended over the past three years, indicates an average supply of 524,300 acre feet, of which we have estimated 229,000 acre feet could be utilized if arrangements were made whereby the entire supply

of the lake could be drawn out, "During the present year the utilization has amounted to 120,000 acre feet."
