

TALK OF THE TOWN.

The Bishop meet to-morrow night. Yesterday was pay day on the Utah Central.

Ogden's electric light tower is approaching completion. Scaled proposals for contracts on the new University building are in order.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Official Changes.—We learn from the Bear Lake Democrat that Hon. J. C. Rich has resigned his office of Auditor and Recorder of Bear Lake County, and that John U. Stucki has also resigned his office of Treasurer of said county.

Wm. L. Rich has been appointed Treasurer to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of J. U. Stucki. J. U. Stucki has been appointed Recorder of Bear Lake County, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Christian Wallentin. These changes go into immediate effect.

A Shooting Sensation.—The Ogden Herald of Tuesday has the following: "This afternoon, between 2 and 3 o'clock, two boys entered into W. A. Wade & Co's. drug store, relating a story, which if substantiated, should lead to further consequences beyond this publication. This forenoon the boys, one of whom is a twelve-year old son of McMillan, was shot dead last year under suspicious circumstances, went up to the graveyard, the latter to visit his father's grave, the other that of some relative. While the boys were strolling about the 'mounds of the dead,' another, bigger boy, accosted them, ordering them to leave, and threatening them with shooting. On their refusing the third party fired a shot which took effect on young McMillan, the ball entering the hollow of his hand and passing out by the knuckle. The boys at once came to town, young McMillan replying to his mother, who sent the lad to Wade's drug store, where Mr. W. A. Wade gave him necessary instructions to attend to the wound which, fortunately, is not serious.

The Oratorio.—The state of the weather, last evening, kept many away who would have attended the Theatre had it been more favorable. Still the house was by no means a small one. Nearly every seat in the lower part of the building was occupied, and the audience gave every evidence of being thoroughly appreciative. The sublime oratorio, "The Creation," a grand and difficult masterpiece, was rendered for the first time in Utah, and that too, in a very creditable manner. After the protracted season of opera, ballet and other entertainments of a lighter character, varied only by the Keene Shakespearean season, it was a positive treat to listen to something so solemn and sublime as an oratorio. Of course the concert had its failings, but they were fully overbalanced by its good points.

The soloists, deserving of special mention were, Mrs. Hamilton, Miss White, Messrs. Gorinski, Carlisle, Williams, and bearing a few slight deviations from time and tune—Mr. Hollister. Of Mr. Gorinski, the young artist, who sang the opening solo and the closing duet, scarcely too much can be said. His rich baritone voice sounded with a spirit and force which was highly appreciated, and he carried off the honors of the evening. The choruses were excellent. The orchestra played well, and the entire affair was conducted by Professor Radcliffe. The Philharmonic Society have reason to be gratified with their success in presenting "The Creation."

The Tax Case Non-suited.—This morning, Chief Justice Hunter rendered a decision in the case of George Crimmon vs. the Bingham Canyon and Camp Floyd Railroad. This action was brought by the plaintiff, as tax collector of Salt Lake County, to recover from the defendant the taxes due and delinquent for the years 1876, 1877, 1878 and 1879, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$8,940. Messrs. Sutherland & McBride argued the case for the defendant, and Messrs. Royle, Merritt & Baikin for the plaintiff. The defendants objected to the taxes for the years 1876, 1877 and 1878, assessed under the act of the Legislature of 1885, on the grounds that the assessments were not properly made, for those years. The reasons assigned were:

1st. That no sufficient description of the defendant's property was contained in the assessment rolls for those years, and that they did not contain the proper headings.

2d. That the figures denoting the value of the property were not prefixed by the \$ mark or by other prefix denoting the value.

3d. That the assessment rolls were not made and returned by the officer within the times required by law.

4th. That the rate per cent. for the county levy was not written at the head of the tax roll, as required by law.

5th. That the tax rolls were not made in accordance with the provisions of the statute of 1885.

These objections were sustained by the Court last Monday morning, after elaborate argument by counsel, and the assessment rolls and tax lists for those years were excluded from being given in evidence.

As to the taxes assessed for the year 1879, the defendant objected on these grounds:

1st. That the assessment roll for 1879 did not contain a sufficient description of the property of the defendant.

2nd. That the assessment did not give the name of the defendant correctly.

3rd. That the tax roll for that year was not certified by the county clerk at the time required by the act of 1879, and before its delivery to the tax collector.

4th. That the tax imposed on the defendant was not prefixed by the \$ mark.

5th. Because the collector, not having a properly certified tax roll in his possession, had no warrant to distrain for taxes, and that until he had such a tax roll, he had no right to distrain, as required by law, before bringing suit, and therefore could not maintain this action.

The Court overruled the first and second objections of the defendant, and sustained the third, fourth and fifth objections, and consequently excluded the tax roll, whereupon, on motion of defendant, a non-suit was granted, to which plaintiff excepted, and proposes to take the case to the higher courts for final determination.

The latter decision was given this morning. The arguments in the case have consumed nearly four days. The opinions for the most part, were given orally, hence we can only give our readers a synopsis of the points decided.

Those Gully Dams.—The City Council last evening, on the recommendation of its committee on streets and alleys, appropriated the sum of \$25, to reimburse E. M. Cast for certain work done by him on the eastern suburbs of the city, in a gully cut by the action of high water on the western verge of the bench in that locality. He has gone to considerable labor and expense to construct three dams in the gully referred to, with the hope that when future floods shall come that way, the sediment will be caught by the dams and the gully gradually filled up, thus benefiting not only the property of Mr. Cast in that vicinity, but other property as well. He applied several weeks ago to the Council for the privilege of doing this work, stating that he would leave it to the municipal authorities to reimburse him as they saw proper for his labor in the interests of the corporation. The Council at that time did not see fit to authorize him to perform the work, nor did they forbid him to prosecute it. He therefore proceeded with and accomplished it and sent an estimate of the cost of the same to the Council at its session on the 21st inst. The matter was referred to the committee on streets and alleys and was reported upon last evening. The Council were disposed to allow that the estimate of labor and means expended was correct, and, notwithstanding some apprehensions expressed to the effect that the dams would be swept away by the first flood that appeared, that the work had been done in good faith and in a thoroughly substantial way. Still, in view of the fact that Mr. Cast, in the performance of his work, had labored especially in his own behalf, and for the more cogent reason that the city finances were in a condition to warrant a larger expenditure, the above mentioned limited sum was appropriated. While this does not half repay Mr. Cast for his work, it shows that the City Council were willing to do something for him—to doubt all they felt justified in doing just at present.

The Home Dramatic Club.—On Saturday evening, the 23rd inst., and on Monday evening, the 25th (Decoration Day), the Home Dramatic Club of this city will perform, for the first time away from Salt Lake, at the Union Opera House in Ogden. The first night they will present the "Banker's Daughter," the justly celebrated play which created such a furore, and won for the Club its enviable triumph for last winter. Their second appearance will be in "Corralle," an entirely new piece, just arrived and never yet played in Utah. The casts of both dramas will include the favorite actors, Miss A. Adams, the full strength of the Club, and other talented ladies and gentlemen from this city.

The drama of "Corralle," under the efficient leadership of Mr. Willard Wells, the talented young violinist, will supply the music. Our Weber County friends should not fail to see these performances. We can promise all who patronize them, a rich dramatic treat.

Swiss Saints.—The first company of Saints from the Swiss Mission, this season, will leave Bern on the 14th inst. They number from 60 to 85 persons. So we learn from private correspondence.

The Co-op. Scrip Case.—This was the day set for the trial of the case of Z. C. M. I. vs. O. J. Hollister, for the recovery of \$9,500, tax assessed on the scrip of the Institution by the defendant as U. S. Collector, together with the accrued interest on that amount, since it was paid over pursuant to an order of the Court to that effect. This afternoon the attorneys, witnesses and jurors were in attendance, awaiting the close of the case of James McKnight vs. Henry Collins, which preceded the above action on the docket, but as the trial continued longer than was expected, the jurors and witnesses in the other case were excused until 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.
