

The County Board Says Charges Against Him Were Unjustified.

THOROUGHLY INVESTIGATED

Full Text of the Report, Showing Clearly Conditions at the County Infirmary.

The board of county commissioners which for some time past has had under consideration the charges made against Supt. W. R. Jones of the county infirmary, has submitted its report, fully exonerating Mr. Jones from having been guilty of any irregularitles in the conduct of his office. The report follows in full:

Salt Lake City, Utah, July 16, 1903. To the Board of County Commission-

ers, Salt Lake County. Gentlemen-There having been re. ferred to your committee on county building and grounds certain accusa-tions made against Supt. W. R. Jones of the County Infirmary, your commit-tee has made a thorough investigation, and submits its report herewith: Investigation was made early in Feb-

ruary of this year, but owing to the chairman of the committee making a visit to the east, a report was not sub-mitted in that month. During his ab-sence a grand jury was called, and as it was said that this identical matter was to be investigated by that body the committee report was further held in abeyance, that nothing should be in the way of the most thorough and searching inquiry. From the witnesses called and the time consumed there-with, it is readily determined that the grand jury investigation was rigid and complete; and from the report submitted it is evident that the jury came to a similar conclusion with your com-mittee, namely, that there was no just

cause for the accusations. Here are two communications to Commissioner Standish on the subject, made at his request:

missioner, City: "Dear Sir—Replying to your oral re-guest for a copy of the charges pre-ferred against Superintendent Jones of the County Infirmary, made by Messrs, Harker and Horne at a meeting of the board held on the 3rd inst., let me say that there were no exceeding charges that there were no specific charges made against Mr. Jones. Mr. Harker in his motion to remove Mr. Jones said that he had asked him to report on cash received for cows, pigs and produce sold. Mr. Horne made the state-ment that since Mr. Jones had assumed ment that since Mr. Jones had assumed charge of the infirmary he had dis-posed of four tens of hay valued at \$12, \$250 worth of pigs, \$100 received from the pauper fund, \$130 for a cow, and a ton or more of carrots, beans avial other produce. Mr. Horne further stated that a quantity of groceries had been sent to Mr. Jones' residence, for which the county had to foot the bill. Dear Sir-In reply to your letter dat-ed Jan, 17, 1963, will state that what we wanted from Mr. Jones was a com-plete statement of all property disposed of by Mr. Jones during his office term. We have been unable to get this statement from Mr. Jones, and it was on that account that the resolution was possed relieving him from the position, of superintendent of the infirmary. The reports which Mr. Jones made monthly to the county auditor were always open to our inspection, but they do not include the matters upon which we want-Mr. Jones to report. We referred particularly to about four tons of hay taken from the stack at Josse Fox' place, which stack the county had bought. These four tons were not delivered to the infirmary. Four cows, three taken from the infirmary in the summer of 1901, and one in the fall of 1902. About 17 hcgs that were taken from the infirmary in the fall of 1901, and in the spring and fall of 1902. Five young pigs taken early in 1902; 2,100 pounds carrots taken from the infirmiary through the spring of 1902, and other vegetables taken from the infirm. ary through the spring and summer of 1902. We also demanded to know of Mr. Jones what disposition he had made of the \$100 which was taken from the paper fund, and given to Mr. Jones to be used by him in buying vegetables and green Green in buying vegetables and green groceries for the Mr. Jones and green greceries for the infirmary. We also wanted to know of Mr. Jones what amount of money he had on hand from the sale of any of this property, and what amount of money he had in his contingent fund. We wanted to know of Mr. Janes what disposition had been made by him of the s26d in currency found in the solether the \$264 in currency found in the clothes of an inmate of the infirmary, who died at the infirmary some time in the early summer of 1902. This man had been dependent upon the county for some time prior to his death and had paid nothing for his keep while at the infirmary.

"These are items which have come to our attention, but what we wanted of Mr. Jones was a complete report of all the property disposed of from the in-firmary, whether we knew of its being

These items mentioned by me arsimply examples of what we mean, and of what matters we intended he should report to the board of commissioners. If there is any assistance I can give you in these matters, do not hesitate to call upon me. Yours respectfully "WILLIAM J. HORNE."

Taking up the allegations in their order, your committee says that if the commissioners named had wanted a statement from Supt. Jones at any time, they could have obtained it by any regular form known to the law. They composed a majority of the board. Neither the board of commissioners nor the committee on infirmary of the board of which Messrs. Harker and Horns were members, asked for such i

statement. Every monthly or other statement required of Mr. Jones by the commission committee was made. The memor anda account at the infirmary was open at all times to the members of the board of commissioners, and all bust ness done was within knowledge of the committee, except such matters as wer necessarily attended to in their absence and these matters always were within their reach. Their business was transacted under general orders of the com mittee on infirmary, given to Mr. Janes
