

KEEPING BABIES ALIVE AND WELL.

Children Reared in Perfect Health for Five Cents a Week, and \$3.000 Profit a Year Made at That.

Modern society seems to be opposed to babies. Fewer of them are born and more of them seem to die. The elaborate appliances of civilization for preserving life by hospital, etc., are apparently outstripped by its resources, in the shape of the filth incident to a big city and of the hurry and worry inseparable from modern life, for destroying it. The mortality among children this summer has been very great. The most successful life-saving institution in the world, as far as babies are concerned, is probably the Antwerp (Belgium) creche. It was founded in 1866, during the cholera epidemic. The charge for taking care of a child is only a cent a day, or 5 cents per week. At these low rates, the annual profit is over \$3,000. The following sketch of its management will be found of value. For the food of very young infants there is provided a bread-soup, or biscuit panada, made of white bread and arrowroot boiled in milk and water. This is given at 10 a.m., and between 2 and 5 p.m., and for a drink between times, thin barley-water. For unweaned children 7 months old and more, the panada is given once a day, in the morning; at 2 o'clock p.m. a pap of gruel; and three times a week a bouillon of beef or veal, from which the fat is carefully skimmed. This soup is to be prepared with semolino (a sort of bran). For children who have been weaned, at 10 a.m. the panada, but thicker; at 12.30 p.m. beef or veal soup, with rice and semolino, followed by vegetables, of which potatoes are not to constitute more than the one-sixth part; at 5 p.m. slices of bread and butter; for drink, a ptisan flavored with licorice. All these drinks and soups are made fresh every day. The creche is carefully, thoroughly and continuously ventilated, and streams of fresh air poured in constantly; but the children are never exposed to any draught. No flowers are allowed; the cradles are aired frequently and the infants taken into the air as often as the weather permits. The temperature of the creche is kept as nearly as possible at 60 degrees Fahrenheit, but lowered a little in the evening. In respect of cleanliness, the regulations of the creche seem to leave nothing to be desired. Every child is washed and combed in the morning and before the first meal, and its hands and face washed after eating. They are undressed, sponged all over when washed, then rubbed dry with clean towels. From May till October they have a tepid bath every day, two hours after eating, remaining in the bath ten minutes. Scolding is rarely resorted to, corporal punishment absolutely forbidden; the rule of treatment is tenderness. They may be caressed but not embraced; their sleep is not to be interrupted; they are never to be excited; nor lifted up by one arm, nor let lie too long upon the same side; confectionery is prohibited, and the babies kept with head cool, stomach easy, feet warm.

Attention to these rules, not only in American creches but in American homes, would save thousands of infant lives every year. Ignorance is largely responsible for the present massacre of the innocents. —Washington Star.

The Agricultural Society of France has organized a competitive trial of reaping machines, to take place at Versailles, in July. The prizes offered for those of French manufacture are: First, 500 francs and a gold medal; Second, 200 francs and a silver medal; and various honorable mentions; and next, for those of foreign countries similar rewards; lastly, 500 francs offered by the Council-General of the Oise, for a trial between the two principal winning machines, French and foreign.

It remained open one day, and the same night a party of citizens destroyed the stock, smashed a billiard table, and scared the proprietor out of town.

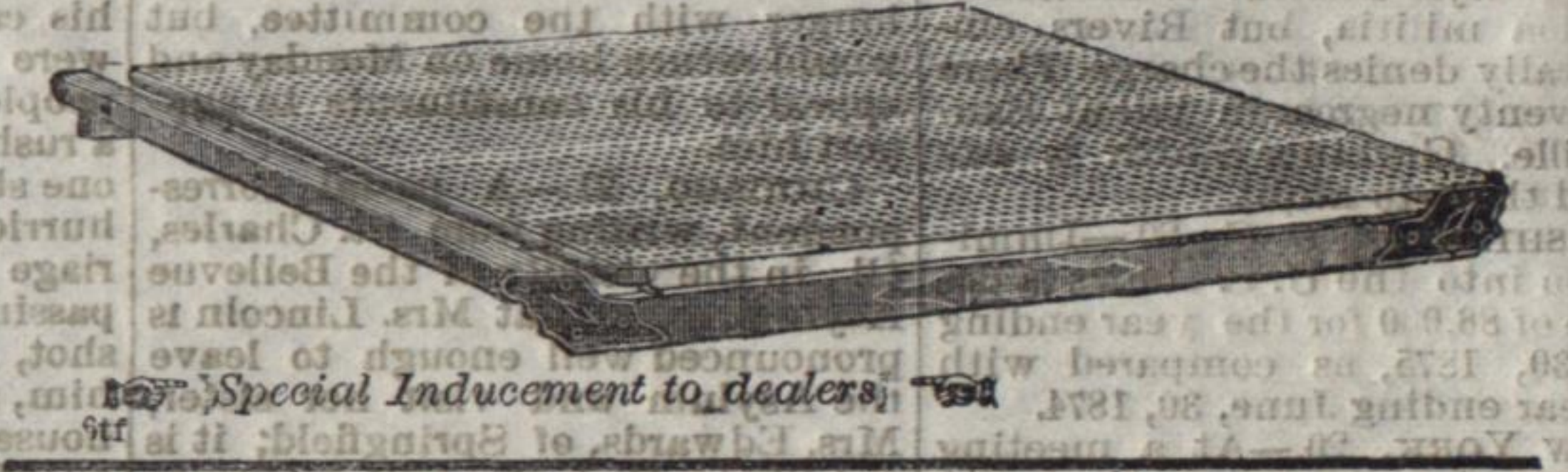
