BIG DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST O. S. L.

William H. Davis Wants \$25,000
For Personal Injuries Received at Kemmerer.

BUSINESS IN DISTRICT COURT.

Demurrers in Damage Suits Sustained.
—O. K. Zufall Held for Forgery
—News Briefs.

An action for damages has been filed in the second district court by William H. Davis against the Oregon Short Line Railroad company to recover \$25,000. The complaint alleges that the defendant company has an engine house and tracks along the public highway at Kemmerer, Wyo. That on the opposite side of the highway from the engine house is a ravine about six feet deep and 40 feet wide. That on the evening of Feb. 13, 1904, the plaintiff was riding along the said highway in a sleigh driving carefully. That the defendant had permitted one of its cars to be pushed off its track across the said highway blocking the same but did not put any danger signals out to warn the public of the existing danger and defendant's team turned to pass around the car when it fell into the ravine throwing plaintiff and his sleigh into the same, injuring plaintiff's back, shoulders, legs and spine, causing him great pain and suffering and permanent injury. That plaintiff was about 30 years of age and earning a salary of \$150 per month. Wherefore plaintiff prays for damages in the sum of \$25,000 and costs of suit.

DISTRICT COURT BUSINESS.

Three brothers, James, Nicholas and Pete Arnesen, were killed in the Ogden, Utah, cut-off explosion at Jackson on the line of the Southern Pacific Feb. 19, when the car of powder exploded. Petitions for issuance of letters of administration to Theodore K. Carls have been filed. The estates consist of a company car from the railroad company, and a suit for damages against the company, for the death of the three brothers. In the suit brought against the Oregon Short Line by T. J. Kennedy and the one brought against the Union Pacific by Lou V. Stegner, the demurrer of the railroad companies to the two suits was sustained and the cases were in which to amend the complaints. The court held that the demurrers of the railroad companies were well taken, holding that an action must be brought in the county and state of which the plaintiff is a resident, and if a transient the action must be brought in the county where the company has its head office, and in this case it is Salt Lake City, where the company's headquarters are.

WAS FOND OF CHERRIES.

This morning ex-Sheriff Gordon of Brigham City brought to Ogden from the Lucin cut-off an Austrian whom he took to Brigham to answer to the charge of housebreaking. From the man, it is alleged, broke into a cannery and on the cut-off, stealing therefrom cases of canned cherries.

STOLE HIS GIRL'S WATCH.

Ed Bagley, who was arrested on the charge of larceny, it being alleged that he stole a gold watch belonging to Miss Rachel Shaw, his sweetheart, which he had pawned in this city, was arraigned before Judge Howell this morning. He entered a plea of not guilty, whereupon his hearing was set for Tuesday next at 10 a. m. Bagley claims the girl gave him the watch.

ROOM BURGLARIZED.

The police were notified this morning that a room in the Arcade rooming house had been broken into and a \$10 gold piece, five or six dollars in silver, a German time pin, a check signed by George Wheelwright for \$5, and other articles of value stolen. The police have absolutely no clue.

HELD UP AND ROBBED.

George Wilcox reported to the police this morning that he was held up near the corner of Grant and Twenty-fourth streets, his assailant being a masked man, who took from him \$10.

AUSTRIANS RELEASED.

Three Austrians who were arrested for tampering with the mail boxes in the postoffice were released from custody this morning on showing that they had no knowledge of wrong doing, as they were simply trying to find their own box. For some weeks past mail has been taken from certain boxes in the postoffice and the police are trying hard to locate the guilty parties, but thus far have not been able to.

IDAHO.

Weekly Crop Bulletin and Weather Report.

U. S. department of agriculture, Idaho section climate and crop service, weather bureau. Weekly crop bulletin, for the week ending Monday, May 23.

The weather of the week was somewhat changeable, especially over the eastern portion of the state, where the temperature changes were very marked; however, the average of temperature was somewhat above normal, and by the close of the week all sections were in good condition.

High wind was reported; light to copious showers occurred in northern and eastern localities on the 18th, 19th and 20th inst. In some instances accompanied by brilliant electric light. A few eastern correspondents note the occurrence of hail which appears to have done little damage except over a limited area in Blaine and vicinity. In the western valleys no precipitation was reported. The prevalence of higher temperatures, water in streams and lakes is rising rapidly.

CROPS.

Fruit—Conditions have been favorable for the rapid development of fruit; some fruit was blown from the trees by high wind, but it is thought no serious harm was done; late developments indicate that the general yield will not be greatly affected by the frosts which occurred earlier in the month; in south-west valleys early cherries and strawberries are ripening; in the north districts fruit trees and shrubs are blooming profusely; the weather has been favorable for spraying.

Grain—Several crops made rapid progress during the week; wheat, barley and grain on sandy soil was blown over by high winds; in portions of the Payette valley fall wheat has begun to head, and the grain is in good condition; the germination of late sown spring grain has been assisted in many localities by timely showers; seeding is complete in all but the most elevated localities.

Grass—Alfalfa and clover are beginning to bloom in favored sections, and harvest of the first crop will probably be commenced in localities during the present week; all hay crops are in satisfactory yield; grass on the lower ranges has begun to dry up, but elsewhere there is an abundance.
