Jackson, Miss., Jan. 2.—Gov. James K. Vardaman, in his annual message to the Mississippi legislature, which as-sembled today, again took a strong stand against spending public money for the education of the negro, saying

"As a race the negro is deteriorating morally every day. Time has demon-strated that he is more criminal as a free man than as a slave; that he is increasing in criminality with fearful ra-pidity, being one-third more criminal in 1890 than he was in 1880.

"In the south, in Mississippi particular-ly, I know that he is growing worse every year. You can scarcely pick up a news-paper whose pages are not blackened with an account of an unmentionable crime committed by a negro brute; and this crime. I want to impress upon you is but the manifestation of the negro's aspiration for social equality, encouraged largely by the character of free education in vogue, which the state is levying tribute upon the white people

to maintain.
"It is your function to put a stop to
the worse than wasting of a half-million dollars annually—money taken from the toiling white men and women of Mississippi—and devoted to the main purpose of making something of the main growhich the great Architect of the Universe failed to provide for in the original plan of creation."

GOVERNMENT RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES.

Washington, Jan. 2.—The monthly comparative statement of the government receipts and expenditures shows that the total receipts for December, 1995, were \$50,350,463 and the expenditures \$44,321,46, leaving a surplus for the month of \$5,418,718. The receipts from the several sources of revenue follow: Customs, \$24,962,571, increase \$3,340,000; internal revenue \$23,221,128, increase \$1,857,000; miscellaneous, \$2,166,662, increase \$111,000.

The civil and miscellaneous expenditures aggregated \$2,254,231, increase \$400,000; on account of the war department, \$6,233,002, increase \$390,000; navy department, \$9,419,144, decrease \$1,750,000.

The total receipts for the month exceed those for December, 1904, by \$3,302,000 and the expenditures exceed those for the corresponding month of 1904 by \$3,334,000.

For the first half of the fical year ended Dec. 31, 1905, the receipts exceeded those for the corresponding period last year by \$4,072,300.

MARYLAND TRUST OFFICIALS INDICTED.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 2.—The grand jury which has been investigating the affairs of the Maryland Trust company under the old regime, today returned indictments against three of the former officials. One of them. Henry J. Bowdoin, who was vice president and in active charge at the time of suspension, was arrested on a caplas from the criminal court and released under a bond of \$10.000. The other two have not been arrested and until they are taken into custody their names are withheld.

It is stated unofficially, however, that they are G. Wilcox Brown, former president of the company, now residing at Afton, Va., and J. Bernard Scatt, formerly the company's treasurer and now it is said, a resident of Georgia.

The presentments charge violation of the law prohibiting the issuing of "faise or fraudulent statements regarding the financial condition of any corporation." No specific offense is cited, and the Maryland Trust company is not named.

Veteran Comic Opera Comedian Tells Some Good Sporting Yarns to the "News."
