## CONGRESSIONAL.

### SENATE.

Sherman reported back adversely to various bills for the abolition of the income tax.  
A number of bills were introduced and referred.  
The bill to incorporate the Southern Express Company, was discussed and passed by thirty-one to fifteen.

### HOUSE.

Porter reported a bill removing the political disabilities from some twenty-five persons, chiefly residing in Virginia, and from W. K. Turner, of Nashville, Tenn., Judge of Davidson County Court, which position he holds in violation of the 14th amendment. Passed by 111 to 63.  
Cullom introduced a bill to amend the act to provide a temporary government for Montana; referred.  
Ingersoll introduced a bill to encourage ship building in the United States; referred to the committee on commerce.  
The House then proceeded to the consideration of private bills.

### CONNECTICUT.

WATERBURY, 15.—A fire broke out in the large and handsome high school building of this city, about 10.30 to-night. The building was destroyed at midnight. The fire is still raging fiercely, and threatens to destroy that portion of the city. The loss to the city, from the destruction of the school, is about \$75,000.

### WASHINGTON.

Commissioner Wilson to be superseded—The Luxembourg difficulty.

WASHINGTON, 16.—A ridiculous story is telegraphed here from Europe, that President Grant has written an autograph letter to the Emperor Alexander, tendering him the aid of a fleet of war vessels in case of war. It is a pure fiction. It was not deemed worthy of contradiction until it had been repeated here. It is a story out of old cloth.  
Private telegrams received here from Europe, regarding the last phase of the eastern question and the new complications on the Luxembourg difficulty, give rise to a very uneasy feeling. It is known that these matters have been discussed recently in official quarters with unusual warmth, and further developments are anxiously awaited.

It is generally admitted that Commissioner Wilson, of the land office, will be superseded, but that no change will be made until shortly before the dissolution of the present Congress, and that the delay is occasioned by the desire of the President to appoint some member of the present Congress who is not elected to the next Congress.  
Among the nominations sent to the Senate to-day were James E. Callaway, to be Secretary of Montana; A. H. Connor, to be Governor of Idaho.

### CALIFORNIA.

Shot dead in his own house—Fatal encounter.

SAN FRANCISCO.—Charles E. Fisher, business manager of the Sacramento Daily Reporter, and State printing expert, was shot dead in his own house last night by Charles Dell, a young man paying attention to Fisher's daughter, who had just been ordered to leave the house. Fisher struck Dell several blows over the head with a cane before the fatal shot was fired.  
At Colusa, California, yesterday, Dud Shephardson, a farmer, and Len Stevens, an employee, had a fight, Stevens attacking with a pitchfork, and Shephardson repelling with a revolver. Four shots were fired; two went through Stevens' lungs and the other two went through Shephardson's thigh and body. Both are mortally wounded.

### FOREIGN NEWS.

#### FRANCE.

Germans retreating towards Paris—Exploits of France-Tireurs.

TOURS, 15.—The *Moniteur* says the French are reinforced at all points.  
HAVRE, 15.—The Prussians have withdrawn from this section, and the country around is open to Yvetot.  
TOURS is no longer menaced. They are retreating towards Paris. Gambetta is not coming to Bordeaux. He has gone to the army of the Loire and will remain with it for the present.  
BORDEAUX, 14, evening.—The government here has given to the public as yet nothing official from Paris. The excitement in the city is intense, people coming from all quarters to hear news of the great sorties which they believe have taken place in Paris. It is said an aid-de-camp of General

Trochu's has arrived here. A review was held here to-day of the battalions which are about to set out to reinforce the army of the Loire. An immense number of troops, well equipped, were on the ground.  
The Franco-tireurs are very active. We hear of their exploits in all parts of the country. Several convoys of provisions were recently surprised by them and many Prussians taken prisoners. The Garibaldians have inflicted heavy losses, in killed and wounded, on the enemy, in the eastern department, and have hindered their progress. The government of national defense has made Ricciotti Garibaldi a member of the legion of honor.

#### GERMANY.

Bismarck ill—Napoleon will not return to Paris by military power.

WILHELMSHOFEN, 12.—The Emperor is in perfect health. He has received visits from Chevalier Wykoff, of New York, and Casagrac. Bismarck is confined to his room by illness. In conversation the Emperor has declared he will never return to Paris by military power; that the people four times approved his election, and they alone have the right to restore him. He further declared that with his own knowledge the Duc d'Aumale had four years persuaded Orleans to enter the army; hence the opposition of the officers to the restoration of the Empire.

#### GREAT BRITAIN.

The French Indignant against Gambetta.

LONDON, 14.—The *Herald's* correspondent at Versailles has sent the following reports: Versailles 9th: Everything is quiet. We have snow and intense cold. It is reported that Paladines insists upon appearing before a court martial.  
The French are indignant against Gambetta.  
LONDON, 15.—The *Times* says it is not England's duty at once to resist the absorption of Luxembourg. Perhaps Prussia thus satisfied may forego Lorraine. A cabinet council to-day is expected to define England's attitude.  
The French prohibit the navigation of the Seine.  
Engagements have occurred favorable to the French.

#### AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, 14.—Austria adheres unreservedly to her decision on the conference, wishing to maintain guarantees, yet desirous of sparing Russian susceptibilities.

#### PRUSSIA.

Neutrality of Luxembourg question.

BERLIN, 14.—The government declares to the powers concerned about Luxembourg, that in the face of the latter's violation of neutrality it reserves to itself full freedom for the future.

#### RUSSIA.

An Additional Levy.

ST. PETERSBURG, 14.—A levy of six men in the thousand is ordered, to replace the men lost in consequence of shortening the terms of service for 1871.
